THE TOBACCO MARKET. SEED LEAF AND HAVANA

For the Week Ending Saturday, October 8, 10 A. M.

U. S. Tobacco Journal. A calm has at last settled over the leaf market and the wild rush, bustle and excitement of the last month has subsided. This must not be construed, though, as if our market had become dull and inactive. There is the same desire on all sides to buy as has characterized the market of late but the sellers are too independent and ask such figures that stifle even the recklessly disposed would be investors. Holders of '80 Connecticut, especially, exhibit an air of independence calculated to inspire outsiders of the tobacco trade with astonishment and reverence. For many years past packers of Connecticut have fared badly on their investments. Connecticut had gone out of fashion and no matter how really good the leaf, manufacturers and jobbers could be induced with

great difficulty only to take it off their hands. Up to about a week ago the wrappers of the '80 Connecticut crop had been treated with the utmost indifference by manufacturers and jobbers. Suddenly a change has come over them. Now they want the tobacco; now they can't get it. Holders evidently intend to get . square with an unappreciative tobacco trade; they want 30, 40 and 50 cents for fine wrappers; if you can't pay for it you are not urged to take it. No one can blame sellers for their policy; if their claim that the '80 Connecticut is the finest ever raised in the state is correct (and we have repeatedly urged our readers to pay more attention to this crop than they were in clined to do) they will get their There is no substitute except Sumatra for fine wrappers-there is no excess of them and indications are not wanting that very soon fine wrappers will not be found in our market before this year is out. '80 Pennsylvania is already very much sorted out, and but few holders still have choice lots: '80 Wisconsin is almost out of the market; '80 Ohio and New York state possess but a minimum of good stocks. Consequently there is no check to the aspirations of holders of fine tobaccos. From the revenue report it is seen that the cigar manufacturing business is as flourishing as ever, and from what we learn no abatement in activity is anticipated and orders for months ahead are being held by manufacturers.

A New Firm. The New York leaf market is about to have an additional, and by no means insignificent addition, to its leaf firms. Mr. S. Pretzfeld, for many years of the Pittsburgh, Pa., leaf firm Pretzfeld Bros., has formed a co-partnership with one of the leading Lancaster tobacco men and rented the premises 180 Pearl street, for an extensive leaf establishment. Mr. Pretzfeld is a thorough judge of tobacco, personally supervises the packing of leaf in the country, and has the reputation of an able and trustworthy business man. The style of

unparalleled activity. More tobacco changed hands than was ever before recorded here in a single month, the total transfers amounting to 22,100 cases. Business was equally active in the producing sections of the country during the same time, buyers from all the prominent markets traversing with unexampled rapidity the various lines of communication leading to the tobacco fields of the seed leaf growing states. More tobacco was purchased in the field

in September, as well as in our local ware houses, than was ever known before. The cause of this unusual activity is, it is hardly necessary to remark, to be found in the prosperous condition of the country at large and the general belief that de-sirable seed leaf is likely to be scarce and dear the coming year.

High prices have uniformly been paid for the green crops of the past year, and a corresponding appreciation has been established on old stocks. It is not improbable that the highest rauge for both new and old has already been reached, the close of the past growing season having mater ially improved the early bad prospect of the new crop, upon which the advanced prices of both new and old were based. The rates at which seed leaf has been bought and is to be sold this year are cal culated to diminish our export trade, but the falling-off in this direction is likely to be offset by an increased demand for home consumption.
