That in addition to the requirements under the act of General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, entitled "An Act Relating to Registration of Births and Marriages by Boards of Health wherever established by law in the cities of this Commonwealth," it is hereby ordained that when any person shall die in the city of Lancaster it shall be the duty of the physician who attended during his or her last illness, or of the coroner when the case comes under his jurisdiction, to make a faithful return of the same at the expiration of every three months to the the expiration of every three months to the secretary of the Board of Health, in manner and form as is provided in the said act of Assembly in case of marriages and births, setting forth in said return, as far as the same can be ascertained, the name, age, sex. color, nationality, date and cause of death of the deceased person

SEC. 2. Any person who shall neglect to obey the provisions of the first section of this ordinance shall forfeit and pay the sum of ten dollars, for each and every offense, to the secretary of the Board of Health, which sum shall be recovered and be for the uses prescribed in the act establishing a Board of Health for the city of Lancaster.

General Sherman Asking for More Men. Washington, D.
