sersonable Notes from the Germantown The question as to the advantages of the silo will be more or less decided by the results of the present year. If, after everything in the way of expense in building the silo, filling it and emptying it, etc., there is enough solid evidence to prove its benefit over the common mode of providing fodder for the winter-feeding of cattle to an extent to warrant its adoption, no one will be more ready than ourselves to advocate the introduction of the silo upon farms in general. But we must have such proof; and that is what we are waiting for and thus far have not received.

Receipt tor Curing Meat. As the season has arrived when curing meat is in order, we republish as of old our famous receipt for curing beef, pork, mutton, hams, &c., as follows:

To one gallon of water, Take 11 lbs. of salt, lb. sugar, joz. saltpetre, oz. potash.*

In this ratio the pickle can be increased to any quantity desired. Let these be boiled together until all the dirt from the sugar rises to the top and is skimmed off.

Then throw it into a tub to cool, and when throw it into a tub to cool, and when the efficiency in either form. cold, pour it over your beef or pork. The meat must be well covered with pickle, and should not be put down for at least two days after killing, during which time it should be slightly sprinkled with pow-dered saltpetre, which removes all the surface blood, &c., leaving the meat fresh and clean. Some omit boiling the pickle, and find it to answer very well, though the operation of boiling purifies the pickle by throwing off the dirt always to be found in salt and sugar. If this receipt is strictly followed, it will require only a single trial to prove its superiority over the common way, or most ways, of putting down meat, and will not son be abandoned for any other. The meat is unsurpassed for sweetness, delicacy and freshness of color. Saving the Celery.

When November comes we always feel like saying a word or two about the best mode of saving the celery through the winter. It is the most difficult of all the garden crops to raise to a proper degree of perfection-white, solid, and of good size. When it is small it is an unsatisfying crop to raise. If the spire is in a firm, sound condition when buried it ought to last up to the middle of April. A dry, upland spot, not subject to holding water, should be selected. In storing celery we have usually pursued two modes, both of which row of plants singly, then another row, with some earth between, and so on until about half a dozen rows are finished, then commence another bed, and so on. The soil should be packed in firmly and then banked up, so that the tops of the celery are just covered, then spank-off roof fash ion to turn off the rain. Over this, wide boards, nailed together, should be placed, as a security against moisture, or straw can be bent over and secured at the bottom with bean-poles, and a little gutter to carry off the water at each side. Celery Liver and Kidneys can undoubtedly be cured. Particular attention given to Pivate Disput away thus carefully ought to keep Another plan is to sink barrels into the earth so that the tops are two or three inches below the surface, then stand them compactly full of celery without any soil; put tight covers upon them, so as to exclude all moisture, and then a couple of inches of soil.

For early consumption—that is to say in December and January-it can be preserved in the rows where it is grown, properly covered and protected against meisture.
