GARFIELD'S BACKBONE PRODUCED IN COURT THIS MORNING.

THE SENSATION OF THE GREAT TRIAL

A Section of the Late President's Vertebra Shown by the District Attorney and tdentified by Dr. Bliss. Other Incidents of the Session. Washington, D. C., Nov. 19 .- The

crowd at the Guiteau trial to-day was greater than ever. At nine o'clock Guiteau arrived at the court house without demonstration, and was taken to the prisoner's room. He ate a hearty breakfast. Mr. Scoville, in speaking of Gui-teau's announcement of Judge Magruder's services, said he had not heard of it and that he did not expect any assistance except Robinson.

Court opened without incident. George C. Maynard, an electrican, testified to loaning Guiteau \$25, which seemed to give offense to the prisoner, and he remarked that that was pobody's business. The district attorney said he expected to show that Guiteau borrowed the money from Maynard to buy his pistol. On cross-examination witness said Guiteau looked seedy and hungry. At this the prisoner showed much feeling and frequently interrupted witness, saying he lived in first-class style.

J. N. Burkhart, Maynard's clerk, testified to the loan of money, and said he thought Guiteau's walk and the way he held his head a little peculiar.

Later on Guiteau said he wanted additional counsel and remarked. There are a number of disreputable characters about the court, and some threats of violence have been made. I have no fears for my personal safety. The chief of police has kindly furnished me with a body guard, but I wish to notify all evil-disposed persons, that if they attempt to harm me, my body guard will shoot them down. That's all there is about it then." He added, "Reporters, put that down." Colonel Rockwell next testified to scenes at the depot when Scoville interposed ac-

knowledging the killing. Guiteau (quickly)—No, your honor, we acknowledge the shooting, but not the killing." The next witness was Gen. Swaim, and

oner, who devoted himself to his papers. Mr. Scoville examined the fragment of closely, though he never touched it. He gave no indication of feeling beyond the exhibition of casual curiosity. A recess was then taken before the testimony of Dr. Bliss was finished. Upon the reassembling of court Dr. Bliss resumed his testimony. He was

cross-examined at great length, but maintained that the wound was a mortal one. Dr. Reyburn was also sworn and assisted Dr. Bliss to explain the case. At the conclusion of Bliss' evidence, the district attorney inquired if the defense intended to pursue the same course of examination with all medical witnesses. Mr. Robinson replied : "About the same." Mr. Corkhill thereupon announced that the proscution had intended to close today, but now he thought best to ask post-

Guiteau here attempted to say something when the district attorney, bowing with mock gravity, continued: "It Mr. Guiteau will permit, your hopor, I will move an adjournment." Guiteau appeared to relish the pleasantry and nodding replied, "Oh, certainly you shall have a full chance." The court then

Reported Shooting of Guiteau. It is reported that Guiteau was shot this afternoon, after leaving the court raom, There are several rumors in circulation one of which is that when the van in which Guiteau was riding from the court room back to the jail and had reached tho vicinity of the capitol, a man riding on horseback came up and fired two shots and then rode rapidly away in

the direction of the navy yard. It is not believed that Guiteau was hit at all.

The weather was stormy and wreckage identified as belonging to the plunger was picked up the next day inside the heads. It is supposed they were all lost.

KILLED AND MANGLED. Shocking Railroad Accident at Pough-

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., Nov. 19.-John McGrath and James Sheridan, while walking on 'the railroad' track this morning, were killed by a locomotive. Sheridan was carried three miles on the cow catcher and horribly mangled. McGrath leaves a widow and Sheridan a wife and seven children.
