William Dugan and David Cronin, telegraph employees, while running a hand car on the railroad, near Indianapolis, were struck by a passenger train and

were dragged out in an unconscious condition. One of them died, and at last accounts another was dying, two more being in a critical condition.

The bankers of the District of Columbia called upon Secretary Folger yesterday to pay their respects and quainted with him. They were introduced by Mr. John W. Thompson, president of the National metropolitan bank.

President Garrett, of the Baltimore & Ohio railroad, has received a cablegram from Leon Chotteau, at Paris, which is understood to say that Gambetta's cabinet is favorable to the repeal of the decree prohibiting the importation of American pork and lard.

The smallpox has appeared almost simultaneously in various places in Minnesota and Dakota, most of the cases being scattered, though in one or two localities an epidemic is threatened. In Stearns county, Minnesota, one hundred cases are reported.

Jacob Layman, of 406 West Fiftieth street, New York, attempted to shoot his wife at his house. Peter Henzer interfered to save the woman's life, and in shielding her with his own person he received the bullet intended for her in his left breast. Layman escaped and fled to a saloon at Thirty-first street and Seventh avenue, where he shot and killed himself.

The three masted schooner Joseph II. Huddell, jr., of Philadelphia, which left that port last Thursday for Boston, with a cargo of coal, was run into by an unknown ship, twelve miles east of Absecom, on Saturday night, and in twenty minutes sank in eleven fathoms of water. The crew climbed to the topmasts, where they clung for twelve hours until they were rescued by the steamship Berkshire, from Baltimore, which landed them at Providence, Rhode Island, yesterday morning. The crew consisted of Captain Imley Sharpe, the mate and five men.

Jesse Munn, drunk and disorderly, was shot dead by a city marshal, at Kirksville, Missouri, yesterday. City Marshal Cooper was shot dead by James Sloughter, in a quarrel at Covington, Tennessee, on Saturday night. Henderson Lasaler was murdered by masked men, near Harrison, Arkansas, on Friday night. They broke down the door of the house and shot him three times, in presence of his wife and five children. Thomas Slight, a well-to-do farmer, was found robbed and murdered in his wagon, near Cookstown, Ontario, on Saturday.
