WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—The Republican caucus met at noon today. The full Republican membership, 146, responded. The following candidates were nominated for speaker: Frank Hiseock, of New York; J. Warren Keifer, Ohio; John A. Kasson, Iowa; Mark Dunnell, Minnesota; Godlove S. Orth, Indiana; Julius C. Burrows, Michigan; and Thomas B. Reed, Maine.

First ballot (necessary to choose 74)—Keifer 53, Hiseock 44, Kasson 13, Reed 13, Burrows 10, Orth 8, Dunnell 4. Second ballot—Keifer 53, Hiseock 41, Kasson 16, Reed 12, Burrows 10, Orth 8, Dunnell 3.

Third ballot—Keifer 53, Hiseock 38, Kasson 19, Reed 12, Burrows 10, Orth 8, Dunnell 3. Fourth ballot—Keifer 53, Hiseock 39, Kasson 20, Reed 14, Burrows 10, Orth 8, Dunnell 3; total 146. Representative John D. White, of Kentucky, cast his first vote in this ballot, increasing the total number of votes to 146.

Fifth ballot—Keifer 50, Hiseock 42, Kasson 19, Reed 13, Burrows 10, Orth 8, Dunnell 3; total 146. Sixth ballot—Keifer 54, Hiseock 34, Kasson 18, Reed 13, Burrows 10, Orth 8, Dunnell 3; total 146.

Our Honorable Steward Mops Up the Floor With Our Honorable Half-Dressed—The Pennsylvania Delegation Fixed for Keifer.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—Seventeen out of the eighteen members of the Pennsylvania delegation held a conference this morning at which, after some discussion, all the members present agreed to vote for Gen. Keifer, as speaker. The absentee was Mr. Bayne, who sent word that he will vote for Mr. Hiseock.

STORIES ON THE STAND. His Testimony Staggered the Defense in the Guiteau Case.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—There was no diminution in the crowd at the court room this morning. Among the witnesses called was Emory A. Storrs, of Chicago. He detailed Guiteau's conduct in Washington as an office-seeker; could not express an opinion on the prisoner's sanity, but believed he possessed an ill-balanced mind, though he never saw anything in his conduct to indicate that he (the prisoner) could not distinguish between right and wrong.

Matters in Mexico. MEXICO, Nov. 30.—An attempt was made Saturday to murder Gen. Manuel Dado, of Guanajuato, by two men who had been instigated by his political enemies. Much party feeling has existed in Guanajuato.

The Revere Member Denies his Party. WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—Hyatt Smith, representative from Rhode Island, announced this morning that he will not go into the Republican caucus, but will vote with the Greenbackers for Mr. Lauder for speaker and Mr. DeLamater for clerk of the House.

The Suit Against the City Has Trust Stopped. PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 3.—Police Officer Watson arrested a colored man early this morning in the Twenty-eighth ward, on suspicion of being a burglar. The prisoner quickly thrust a pistol close up to the officer's body and fired, the ball taking effect in the abdomen. The officer fell dangerously wounded, and the negro's good his escape.

The "Thunderer" on the Guiteau Trial. LONDON, Dec. 3.—The Times in an editorial article this morning, discussing the system of allowing juries to count out of the case, says: "The incidents of Guiteau's trial ought not to prejudice our decision in regard to this important question. His boisterous vanity would have insured scenes at his trial under any system."

A Generous Pittsburgher. PITTSBURGH, Pa., Dec. 3.—Andrew Carnegie, of this city, has made an offer to the city of Pittsburgh of a free library, upon which he will expend \$250,000, provided the city will agree to make an annual appropriation for its maintenance.

Weeping Over a Verdict. NEW YORK, Dec. 3.—The jury in the Colles murder case, which counted out of the case this morning, with a verdict of murder in the third degree against Mrs. Coleman. The prisoner and her mother and relatives, were in court and cried bitterly. The highest sentence by law is four years.

A Horrible Discovery. SCANTON, Pa., Dec. 3.—The body of an unknown man was found in an abandoned chamber of the Bellevue shaft last night, with the hands and face entirely eaten away by rats. From the appearance of the clothing, the body had been there for the last five years.

WEATHER INDICATIONS. WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 3.—For the Middle Atlantic states, cloudy weather, followed by light rains, winds, mostly easterly, stationary or higher temperature, lower pressure.

Upton to Go. WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 3.—It is reported at the treasury department that Assistant Secretary Upton will probably tender his resignation to-day or on Monday.

More Star Route Indictments. WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—The grand jury this afternoon brought in six indictments in the star route cases, four being directed against Frederick B. Litley, ex-deputy auditor for the post office department, two against Geo. B. Roff, mail contractor.

Hot Words End in a Murder. ST. LOUIS, Dec. 3.—Two men named Hunt and Dunklin, between whom an old feud existed, met on the road two miles from Fillmore, Andrew county, on Thursday, and after some hot words Hunt shot Dunklin through the head, killing him instantly. Hunt surrendered to the authorities.
