GUITEAU'S CORRESPONDENCE.

TWENTY LETTERS A DAY.

The Assassin's Love of Notoriety. Washington, Dec. 22.-Guiteau came into court this morning, looking, if possible, a little paler than usual, and apparently under some strong-excitement. In a whispered consultation between Scoville, Reed and Guiteau, the latter seemed to be ordering Scoville off the case.

Dr. Theodore Diamond, of Auburn, N. Y., who had been summoned by the defence and returned by the prosecution, then testified that he believed the prisoner to be sane. The hypothetical questions which were put to Dr. Worcester, yesterday, were then read, and witness replied, "I should say he was sane."

During a lull in the proceedings Guiteau shouted: "That reminds me that I opened my mail myself this morning. (Holding up about twenty letters.) Pretty goed mail, too; and only one crank letter in the whole lot. They are beginning to think better of me outside. Hightoned ladies asking for my autograph? They think I'm a big man, but I don't care a snap whether I'm a big man or a

little one. By and by Guiteau broke out again with "Well, I did not notice this before. Here is a letter from Dr. Spitzka. He says he received two hundred letters congratulating him upon his testimony, and only two threatening ones and two from lunaties. That's a pretty good showing when became on here for nothing, while others are handsomely paid by the government. Then here is another from Mi. Beatly—"

Judge Cox.-"That will do, prisoner we have no time to listen to your correspondence." Guiteau-" All right, sir."

NEWARK'S BROKEN BANK.

And Other Interesting Speculations.

The revelations concerning the embezzlement of the city's funds create intense excitement in the city hall and throughout the city. Measures were being taken for a thorough overhauling of accounts in the departments of the municipal government. Auditor Palmer remains in jail utterly demoralized and sustained by stimulants. He is unable to see anybody but his counsel. His office is temporarily in charge of his chief clerk. The treasurer, Winans, has been suspended and two policemen had charge of his office last night to prevent any tampering with the accounts.

This morning Alderman Theberoth, chairman of the finance committee, took THE NEW CHEAP STORE: session.
