THE SEVENTH WEEK.

THE GUITEAU TRIAL RESUMED.

Some More Expert Testimony, With Sug-gestions by the Prisoner. WASHINGTON, Dec. 27.-The seventh week of the Guiteau trial opened with no dimunition in the crowd pressing for admission. Upon opening of court Guiteau smilingly announced that he had enjoyed a nice Christmas dinner, and hoped every-body else did. He said he had fruits, flowers, lady visitors and a good time gen

Dr. A. E. McDonald, superintend ent of Ward's Island (N. Y.) insane hospital, testified that he had treated six thousand cases of insanity. He believed from his observations that the claim of inspiration asserted by insane people proceeds from some insane delusion affecting the senses. In illustration of men acting under such delusion he instanced a man who thought he was Jesus Christ, and who clothed himself like the Saviour, gave away his property, and slept out-doors. The insane usion is manifested by their actions as well as their assertions. Witness thought such a lunatic would entertain no fear of bodily harm, his "inspiration" rendering him wholly oblivious to fears of assault. Such people never planned schemes, and after committing an act seldom attempted to avert the consequences.

The prisoner suggested there were two kinds of insanity, cranks and Abrahamic -he belonged to the Abraham school. Witness went on to say that he had never in all his experience seen a case

where a man is to all appearances sane except with regard to one single act. Witness spent two hours in the cell at the jail with the prisoner; examined and talked with him, and found that the prisoner expected to be sent to the insane asylum, and subsequently obtain his free dom. Witness believed the prisoner was a perfectly sane man. Winess had closely analyzed the actions of the prisoner during the trial, and believes that he is play-ing a part now.

A recess was taken. After the recess Dr. MacDonald again took the stand and Guiteau, who had just taken his seat, looked over to the jury and said: "These experts are doing this business with a good deal of parrot-like talk.
