A collection of delinquent taxes in the city of Lancaster:
SECTION 1. Be it ordained by Select and Common Councils of the City of Lancaster that the Finance Committee shall annually, at the first regular meeting of Councils in the month of September, report to said Councils at the first regular meeting of Councils in the month of September, report to said Councils the amount of city fax due and uncollected on the first day of September, whereupon the City Treasurer shall return the duplicate of city faxes into the hands of the Mayor, after having made out and prepared separate duplicates of all taxes assessed for city purposes, for each of the nine wards of the city, that may remain unpaid on said first day of September.

SEC. 2. It shall be the duty of the Finance Committee, on or before the 15th day of September, in each and every year, to advertise for proposals for the collection of all unpaid taxes of each of the nine wards of the city—the collection of which shall be given to the lowest bidders complying with section third of this ordinance. The Finance Committee shall notify the Mayor whom they have selected as collectors, when he shall immediately place the said duplicates in their hands for collection of the same.

Sec. 3. That the Collectors appointed in pur-

SEC. 3. That the Collectors appointed in pursuance of the second section of the Ordinance shall, before entering upon their duties, give security in two-thirds of the amount of the respective duplicates for the prompt collection and payment over to the City Treasurer of the whole amount due, except so much as they shall be exenerated from collecting by the Finance Committee of Councils from time to time, and the Collectors so appointed and giving bond shall possess and exercise all fhe rights and powers for the collection of said tax as are now possessed and exercised by the Collectors of county rates and levies within this Commonwealth.

SEC. 4. It shall be the duty of the respective Collectors of the city taxes, outstanding after the first day of September, in each and every year, to furnish the City Solicitor on the 15th day of December next succeeding the receipt of their duplicates, the names of all their delinquent property taxpayers on that day, with each one's relative amount of tax, and a proper description of the premises upon which it is assessed, and the selicitor shall duly prepare and file a lien for the amount, on or before the 31st day of December next ensuing, in the Court of Common Pleas of the County of Lancaster, as provided by the Act of General Assembly approved on the 13th
