## THE PRISON.

THE NEW KEEPERS MANIFESTO.

The Full Text of a Paper Read in the Meet-ing of the Board of Prison Inspectors Yesterday, To the Board of Prison Inspectors of Lancas

ter Count?:
GENTLEMEN: My object in addressing you in
this form is that we may perfectly understand
each other in the outstart, and thereby avoid
all conflict of authority.
While I am willing to carry out your orders.

While I am willing to carry out your orders, and adopt your policy, unless it come in direct conflict with my oath of office or my sense of duty, (and even then I shall be open to conviction,) I expect to be the Prison Keeper in every sense the word implies.

I believe it to be my duty, from time to time, to make known to you the wants and condition of the place, and give my views as to what should be done, and if it does not meet your approval, I only ask you to give me something better, or at lesst equally as good, instead. I will be equally zealous to carrying out orders origination with you as those of my suggestion.

You an't are equally aware that t ere has been (justly or unjustly) a great deal of adverse criticism as regards the management of this institution. Now, I am willing to give my aid in making the management such that there shall be no just cause for continued complaint. Discipline Must tiegin Among the Officials. The object o' imprisonment is not alone to punish crime, but to reform the criminal. To punish crime, but to reform the criminal. To get the best results in that direction, prisoners must be under thorough discipline and yet be treated as human beings. Employment is necessary, both for their health and discipline; and they should be a ade to feel that the faith ful performance of their task, and good conduct generally will more to their benefit; that a violation of rules or bad conduct will meet with prompt and certain punishment.

Prison discipline can be maintained successfully only, if it commences among the officers; there must be no condict of authority. Eules and regulations should be adopted only after due deliberation, and then strictly enforced, as well among the officers as among the prisoners. There should be but one relogated head from whom orders mannet and to whom all other officers render willing obedience.

As long as the Prison itself and the walls surrounding the yard are in the present unsurroundition, it will require increased vigilance on the part of the chicers to prevent established. capes. It has been practically demonstrated that the present fron clad cells are a delusion and a fraud. They give a fanct d security which does not exist in reality. If, however, half the thought had been given to constructing perfect from lining for those cells that the prisoners gave to contriving to get through the present lining the causty would not prisoners gave to contriving to get through the present lining, the county would not be minus as much money nor have so worthless a job. There can be no lining put lato cells that cannot be taken out if you commence at this right place, understand your work and have the tools. Fo height as this work to from cells is done from the inside, so long will the prisoner be in position to undo it, and it is only a matter of time and study for him to escape.

But there is no leason why the same cost should not have produced cells that were impregnable, unless the prisoners were furnished with heavy hammers and sledges. To so con-

with heavy hammers and sledges. To so construct a cell the work must be linished from some point to which the prisoner has no access. In my opinion, the many recent attempted escapes, and the last successful one, are the natural result of this imperiect system of froning. The yard wall should be put into a better condition, and be made to have its coping or roof to project at least thirty inches over the inside: then prisoners cannot get over unless they could climb it hand-over hand.

There should be an iron picket fence, or, if that be too expensive, at least a barbed wire fence, along the outside, and at such distinct they could climb it hand-over hand.

There are very strong reasons why the Prison should have telephone connection with the police station-house, at all hours, not along for convenience, but as a matter of safety.

The resolution passed at the regular December mesting, to work the convicts in the new building, it carried out, will, in my opinion, necessitate considerable improvement, and then be fraught with the greatest danger.

Lighther the Prison should be done for less

money-by other means, if it cannot be done with gas. Sound Suggestions and itensonable Demands Gentlemen, my boadstaren are to be responsi-ble for the safety of prisoners, for monies, goods, stock, &c. and yet I cannot appoint a single man out of the ten chicals, who have goods stock, &c., and yet I cannot appoint a single man out of the ten efficials, who have charge of the prisoners, goods, &c., about the place. Now, would it be presuming too much in me to ask you to consider well whom you elect as subordinates? They should not be elected on account of their political influence, or because this or that "boss" demands it, but because they are computent. Their monal standing should be such as to command respect from the prisoners; they should have perfect control of themselves in every respect. Their tonure of office should not depend on the turn of the political which, but on the fathful performance of their duty. They should be discharged for cause only, and then promptly, incompetency, neglect of duty, refusal or neglect to obey orders, or allowing prisoners to escape while in their charge, ought to meet with sure removel.

Either the time of going out of office or the time of election of subordinates should be changed so as to be near one and the same time. The fathere to be reaccered and still being kept on duty three mouths, might produce carelessness. It nothing worse. I do not ask you to appead my political friends in preference to others: I only a definitional is preference to others: I only a definition in a good men. But I do enter my carnest profest against the appointment of men who are only pushed forward because they are known to be obnoxious to me, and for the sole purpose of ombar assing me, and against the se of intemperate habits, or such as are themselves tanted with dish onesty. Parties who are already expressing themselves to the effect that they would not be obnoxious to the effect that they would not be responsible.

Parties who are already expressing themselve to the effect that they would not be resp. naible to me, if appointed are not the persons desired by me. The latter portion of Fee 6, Art. 7, p. 12 of Prison Laws, should be strictly enf. reed.

Steps should be taken for the disposal of all manufactured goods on hand, and hereafter they should be disposed of as made. The practice of carrying ten thousand dollars worth of such goods is unbusiness-like. Carrying field-tions values from year to year brings no good results. The basiness of this institution should be conduct does you would co-clinet your own private basiness. If no large held too high to get them into market, then reduce the price of they will bring the price asked for them, then why are they and sald? There is always a market for goods at their real worth, and this institution should cartainly compete with manufactories where labor is paid for. If not, then we are either paying no much for raw material, or making interfer work; if the former, it is in your pewer to make the improvement; if the latter, t will try to better the quality of the work. Monufacturer, Contracts and supplies. ity of the work.

In order to give the best financial results, all supplies should be contracted for the contracts to be regularly tenexied, and their terms strictly enforced. Parties who furnish supplies should be told, if they conot know, that it is quality and price that gave them the contract in preference to their competitors, and not some outside party's degrand. And, if remarks are correct (which I begin me not their fity of the work.

not some outside party's deviand. And, if re-ports are correct (which I hope are not.) that this institution has sometimes been run by the bosses for their financial and political benefit, they should be made to stand aside, or be put inside the bars. Supplies should be received by one person only—reweighed, remeasured, and a control only—reweighed, remeasured, and a counted for, no matter whether it be a case of tobacco or a box of pills.

The laws governing the Prison need raylsion, and the present fours could do fiself no greater honer, or their constituents better ser-vice, than to go to work jointly with our Court, and revise and have them passed at the next meeting of the Legislature. Almost any change would be for the better. Practical Referms Suggested.

I would call your immediate attention to the following: In justice to myself and the new Inspectors, there should be an inventory taken at once. In fact, I shall take nothing for granted. Not until I know what is here am I ready to go ahead. I desire that hereafter every manufacturing department shall stand on its own bottom. In order to do this, there must be an favontory; uncilical, if not otherwise. No business man would go into a firm, as partner, where the inventory of stock had been taken a month previous to his coming, and in which he had no participation. I have taken the responsibility to order all manufacturing to cease until I shall have time to give all cells a thorough personal inspection.

Owing to the present condition of affairs here, I deem it of sufficient importance to take the extra precaution of having once if the night watchmen on the outside of the corridor all the time, and to exchange them every thirty tine, and to exchange them every thirty minutes, (never allowing them to be together except while receiving prisoners during the night) And, if it meet with your approval, I would like to have an extra man for a few stable.

I should be furnished with a copy of such rules and regulations as are in actual force; and, hereafter, they should be recorded in a book separate from all other matter for the use of the Keeper.

A copy of all contracts should also be furnished me, to the end that I may know whether supplies furnished are in accordance with the contracts.

All furniture and fixtures not in actual use should be removed from the cells of convicts,

removed from the cells of convicts so that attempts to escape may be more readily

Eight Front Door Keys Too Many! Prison keys should be reduced in number to a working minimum. Nine front door keys are seven or eight too many. No officer should be allowed, when going from duty, to carry with him any keys belonging to the Prison; they should be placed in the sate when not in actual use.

There are, in my judgment, good reasons why the practice of selling goods to those who are connected with the Prison, at cost, should can accommended.

Ail projusties, to say the least, have a tendency to demoralize. Then, again, sna'l leaks, if numerous enough, may sink a boat. The profits on goods consumed by seventeen efficials and their families ought to be an item worth considering.

Kvery officer and clerk who carries a key should be sworn and give bond for the faithful performance of his duties. The bond of the clerk should be for such an amount as to be in just proportion with that of the keeper.

Officers or employes, during their hours of duty, should not be allowed to leave the Prison, unless their duties call them out, and then only by permission of the keeper.

The same facilities that gave to convicts the tools they had in their late attempts to break out may have placed keys in their possession; and I deem it of sufficient importance to change all inside cell door locks as a matter of safety.

Do not think that I have said this, or any part of it, in the way of dictation. I have spoken only from the sense of duty, knowing the feeling among the people who placed me here; and inving an interest above and beyond that of my salary. And, further, knowing that your sole aim is the welfare and improvement of this institution, I have an abiding faith that you will make such use of this communication as your wisdom may dictate.
