SALISBURY NEWS.

Items from the Gap and Vicinity, The ponds and dams are covered with an excellent quality of ice, between three and four inches in thickness, and those who have ice houses are busy filling them. The first snow we had this season fell on Wednesday night last.

Mr. Alfred Sanford, of the Gap, has gone to Virginia to visit friends there. Mr. Joseph Miller, of this township, received \$825 for his crop of tobacco, consisting of about three and three quarter acres. It was a very fine crop. Skiles & Frey were the purchasers. The Misses Kurtz sold 22 acres of land, without improvements, in the village of the White Horse, to James Roseboro, for \$160 per

Reuben Martin's new buildings at the White Horse are about being completed. Several other new buildings are in contemplation, and if the "metropolis" of Salisbury, the Gap, does not improve much faster in growth, the White Horse, which has only begun to build up this last year, will lay it completely in the shade.

The coal oil pipe company are surveying a route through the western part of this township, passing by Mast's mill, through the farms of Wilkinson Robinson, J. Warner, George Diller and Isaac Rhoads and others. The company has agreed to pay the land-holders five dollars for a right to go through their property, and when they lay the pipes they will pay all damage done by them. Blame's Last Performance. Ledger's New York Correspondence,

The announcement from Washington that one of the last diplomatic acts of Mr. Blaine before leaving the state department was to address a circular letter to all the Central and South American goveraments, asking them to hold a general conference at Washington in November next, for the promotion of mutual commercial interests, and to take steps to arrest the interference of European nations in the affairs of this hemisphere, is exciting much comment. The effect of this development in Europe, it is believed (coming as it does on the heels of our new departure with reference to the Panama canal and the Clayton-Bulwer Panama canal and the Clayton-Bulwer tree ty), will be to excite mistrust of us there. The whole thing is looked upon as a scheme of Mr. Blaine's for getting up a sort of Holy Alliance on this continent; but, as Mr. Blaine is no longer in office, the vital ques tion is, Does the president sanction it?.

Frightful Accident.
