A Child Dies from Drinking Lye. In Trenton a little daughter of Joseph McDaniels drank part of a cup of concentrated lye, from the effects of which she died in horrible agony.

Shot Through the Heart in a Duel. Manuel Valesco shot through the heart and instantly killed Vecouto Cano in a duel at Chipanaugo, Mexico. Both were lieutenants in the Fifth infantry.

Suicide Despite Friendly Vigilance. Samuel S. Ward, a prominent and wealthy citizen of Port Huron, Mich., committed suicide by taking strychnine, He had been acting very strangely for two or three weeks and had been watched by friends, but cluded their vigilance at

Death of the Wounded Physician. Dr. E. F. Adams, the physician at the Michigan insane asylum, who was stabbed by a patient has died. Dr. Adams was one of the most popular of the medical staff.

A House Riddled With Bullets. An account has been received of a severe skirmish at Westport, La., between J. W. Moore and party, who occupied his store, and a be leging party outside. The house was riddled with builets during the siege, the windows being shot out. Robert Perkins, J. Dykes and Samuel Mericle were killed and several others wounded.

THE DEADLY FIRE-DAMP. A Fatal Explosion at the Lansford Mine of the Lehigh Company.

A terrific fire-damp explosion occurred in mine No. 10 of the Lehigh coal and navigation company, at Lansford. Thomas Parry, of Germantown, the fire-boss, is missing and is believed to be dead. Eight men and one boy were badly injured. Among the latter are Edward Gatels, from Georgetown; three men, named respectively Rymbach, Burns and Kime, and five others from Tamaqua, who are unknown. One of them had his back broken and the others have legs and arms broken and are badly burned and crushed. The explosion was caused by a fall of coal breaking the safety lamp in the hands of Fire-boss Parry. Luckily the fire did not spread and the damage to the mine is con sequently light.

A CLEVER ESCAPE. Breaking Jali While the Jailer Carries To-bacco to the Prisoner.

One of the most daring, successful and well-planned escapes from jail on record was made at the Maiden Lane jail, Albany, on Saturday, giving liberty to William Burke, alias "Billy the Kid," the famous bank and bond robber. The prisoner was recently arrested in Buffalo for being implicated in the robbery of \$117,000 from a Cleveland bank. He was delivered to Albany officers and brought to the city. Burke was confined with the other male prisoners in what is known as the rear portion of the jail. The entrance is from the hall between the sheriff's office and jailer's receiving room. The entrance is guarded by two doors, the outer one being of solid wood with a circular hole near the top, covered with wire netting, the inner door being of iron, the upper half composed of heavy bars. It has been customary to allow the friends of prisoners to stand on the outside of the outer door and talk to their friends through the netting over the circular hole. In the afternoon a stranger called and was granted permission to talk through the netting to Burke. The stranger gave the jailer a package of tobacco for a prisoner who was up stairs. While the jailer was delivering the pack age the man unlocked both doors with false keys, and the Kid with his friend ran from the building and have not since been Telegraph messages have been sent in all directions, the entire force of the city are in search of the fugitive and the sheriff has offered a reward of \$1,000 for his arrest.
