Smallpox and Vaccination. A physician in charge of the quarantine hospital in New York, asserts that vacci nation is not only a preventive but a cure for smallpox. He says:

"Speaking of vaccination I cannot con cur with Dr. Sayre, who recommends vaccination every five years (why not seven?) but from personal experience and careful investigation I am assured that twice in a lifetime-in infancy and adolescence-is sufficient if effectually done. But I go further than Doctor Savre in asserting that effectual vaccination is not only a preventive but a cure for smallpox. It was my habit to vaccinate my smallpox patients in the first stage of the disease, when the premonitory symptoms and even the first appearance in the throat indicated the coming evil, and it was gratifying to see vaccination and smallpox developing simultaneously, and the latter so moditied by the former that a bad case of smallpox was changed into a light form of varioloid. A word more on pitting, the dread of all mankind. I say nothing new when I repeat that the exclusion of light and air will prevent it, as it is the daily observation that the convalescent of the disease may be ever so much pitted in the face, while the body retains no mark of the disease. On this observation I based my application of the flexible collodion, rendered opaque by the addition of iron and tannin, and with the happiest results.

Really the dread of smallpox is only i its contagion. As a disease it is not more dangerous than measles or scarlatina, and our experience on Staten Island of one case in 50,000 inhabitants is about the normal average. Surely no cause for fear when the remedy is in our hands."
