DE LEON, THE BIGAMIST.

He Will be Brought to Lancaster To-Morrow. Chief of Police Deichler left this city yesterday afternoon to bring to Lancaster Dr. George DeLeon, who, in connection with Mrs. Coonley, was indicted for con spiring to debauch Ida Breneman under simulation of marriage. Mrs. Coonley, it will be remembered, was convicted and sentenced, but DeLeon skipped, and noth ing more was heard of him until he turned up, as is alleged, in the Pittsburg work. house under the alias of Fred P. Brown.

The Pittsburg Leader of Wednesday says: "To day Fred. P. Brown was released from the workhouse, but he was immediately arrested again by Detective Langhurst, of Allegheny, on a warrant issued by the Lancaster county courts. Brown, it will be remembered, is the man who was given a two-years' sentence to the workhouse, on a charge of false pretense, it being proven at his trial that he had married a girl named Blattan, and then getting that \$600 from her and skipping. From the nature of the warrant and what the Laucaster county authorities say on the sub ject, Brown was engaged in a similar transaction in that place, he then going under the alias of Dr. George DeLeon. The chief of police of Lancaster is expected in Allegheny this evening and in the meantime the prisoner will be put behind the bars of the Allegheny lockup. Detective Langhurst is positive that Brown and De Leon are one and the same man, as a Market street saloon keeper has identified him as a man who once boarded at his house, and also the man who with two other Lancaster county men wore in the habit of talking about the Lancaster affair.
