RELIGIOUS FACTIONS AT WAR. A Union Church at Coplay, Lehigh County,

A church difficulty, not unlike that which took place at Belleman's church, Berks county, last year, occurred at Coplay, Lehigh county, Sunday afternoon. For the past nine years the Lutheran and Reformed congregations of Coplay have been worshiping in one church, but not until yesterday was there any breach of the peace or interruption to the harmony that has prevailed. The church has heretofore by common coasent been regarde l as a union church, and the Lutheran and Reformed congregations worshiped therein on alternate Sundays. In 1873 the Lehigh Valley iron company donated a lot of ground and \$2,000 towards the election of the church. B. S. Levan, at that time president of the iron company and a wealthy man, centri buted \$1,500 toward the church, with the dea that it was to be a union church. The members of the denominations together contributed \$1,500, and the crection of the church was commerced. The members of the two organizations dug the cellar, laid the foundation walls and together did all the werk peac:fully and harmoniously. In due time the church was dedicated. During the past four weeks, however, there were intimations that trouble was impending, the leaders of the Reformed congregation claiming that their organization owned the building. Nothing scrious was thought of these rumors and the Lutherans paid little heed to them. When, however, Rev. J. D. Shindel, the Latheran paster. and his congregation had assembled they found the doors locked, and as a consequence no services were held. The affair has created great excitement and is still the absorbing topic of gossip. Mr. Schindel advised his people to go home peaceably and indulge in no unseemly conduct. The paper presented to the Lutherans asking for subscriptions to build the church set forth that the structure was designed to be a union church and on the strength of this statement considerable money was secured. To this fact the Lutherans are ready to testify in court, where the matter no doubt will be brought for s: ttlement.
