### THE LAW OF PENNSYLVANIA.

An Act to Provide for the Better security of Life and Limb in Cases of Fire in Hotel and other Buildings. Approved June 11

WHEREAS, In consequence of fires breaking out in hotels, factories and other high buildings, many lives have been lost and great personal injuries suffered, through the want of efficient means of es cape therefrom, independently of the ordi-

nary internal stairways; therefore, Section 1. Be it enacted, de., That all the following described buildings, within this commonwealth, to wit : Every building used as a seminary, college, academy, hospital, asylum or a hotel for the accom modation of the public, every storehouse factory, manufactory, or work shop of any kind, in which employees or operatives are usually employed at work in the third or any higher story, every tenement house or building in which rooms or floors are usupublic school building, when any of such buildings are three or more stories in height, shall be provided with a permaheight, shall be provided with a permanent rafe external means of escape therefrom in case of fire; and it shall be the duty of the owners or keepers of such hotels, of the owners, superintendents or managers of such seminaries, colleges academies, hospitals, asylums, store houses, factories, manufactories or workshops, of the owners or landlords of such tenement houses, or their agents, and of the hoard of school directors of the proper school district, to provide and cause to be affixed to every such building such per-

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of the board of fire commissioners, in conjunc-tion with the fire marshal of the district where such commissioners and fire marshal are elected or appointed, to first examing and test such fire escape, and after upon trial, said fire escape should prove satisfactory, then the said fire marshal, in connection with the fire commissioners, or a majority of them, shall grant a certificate approving said fire escape: Provided further, That in districts where no such fire marshal and fire commissioners exist, then the school directors in each said district shall be the board of examiners, and upon their certificate, or a majority of teem, of approval of said fire escape, shall be sufficient authority for the erection of said fire escape in said district.

Section 3. Every person whose duty at is by the first section of this act to pro vide and cause to be affixed to any of said buildings such external fire escape, and every such school district, shall also be liable in any action for damages, in case of death or personal injury su tained in consequence of fire breaking out in any such building and of the absence of such efficient fire escape; and such action may be maintained by any person now author ized by law to sue in other cases of similar injuries; all persons failing to comply with the provisions of this act, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding (\$300) three hundred dollars, to be collected as fines and forfeitures are now by law col

In fixing valuation of real estate the committee are of opinion that valuation is lower than the properties would bring it put upon the market. The city pays nothing for the use of water for Fire Department and other purposes through 118351 plugs. Water rents for 1881 amounted to \$36,657,37 and rents from markets \$6,474.25. For sinking fund \$12,509 was redeemed in 1891, reducing the funded debt that amount. Valuation of taxable property for 1891 was \$11,000,000.
