FIRE ESCAPES.

THE LAW OF PENNSYLVANIA. An Act to Provide for the Better Security of Life and Property in Cases of Fire in Hotels and other Buildings. Approved June 11, 1879.

WHEREAS, in consequence of fires breaking out in hotels, factories and other high buildings, many lives have been lost and great personal injuries suffered through the want of efficient means of escape therefrom, independently of the ordinary internal stairways; therefore, SECTION 1. Be it enacted, etc., That all the following described buildings, within this Commonwealth, to-wit: Every building used as a seminary, college, academy, hospital, asylum or a hotel for the accommodation of the public, every storehouse, factory, manufactory, or work shop of any kind, in which employees or operatives are usually employed at work in the third or any higher story, every tenement house or building in which rooms or floors are usually let to lodgers or families, and every public school building, when any of such buildings are three or more stories in height, shall be provided with a permanent safe external means of escape therefrom in case of fire, and it shall be the duty of the owners or keepers of such hotels, of the owners, superintendents or managers of such seminaries, colleges, academies, hospitals, asylums, storehouses, factories, manufactories or work-shops, of the owners of tenement houses, of the board of school directors of the proper school district, to provide and cause to be affixed to every such building such permanent fire escape.

The funded debt as above mentioned in 1880, 1881 and 1882, and the interest thereon, on the 1st day of January, 1882, is \$457,912 02. The City pays nothing for the use of water for Fire Department and other purposes than the fixed plugs. Water rents for 1881 amounted to \$32,557 22 and rents for 1882 to \$152 22. For sinking fund \$170,485 00 was returned in 1881, reducing the funded debt that amount. Valuation of taxable property for 1881 was \$11,000,000.
