Lemon Pic.-Grate the yellow part of the rind of one lemon, squeeze out the juice ; dissolve in cold water one table spoonful of corn starch and add to the lemon, then the yelks of three eggs, well

### HOW'S THIS FOR HIGH?

A Little Game of "Seven Up." The following communication is from a reliable gentleman in this city and the facts he vouches for are common talk in political circles :

Prison Keeper Burkholder's manifesto to the board of prison inspectors, published a few days ago, if not in the very best taste, has had the effect of directing public attention to the gross mismanagement of our prison affairs. And as the new keeper, with Spartan-like cour-age, has begun the task of clear ing away some of the mysteries connected therewith, it may be well in this connection to acquaint the public with another "little game," one of the principals to which was none other than a prison inspector. It appears that at the last meeting of the board of inspectors a resolution was passed instructing one of its members (a gentleman who lives not very far from Christiana) to purchase for prisou use six shoats, the price not to exceed five dollars each. The shoats arrived and with them the bill, which latter showed that they had been bought for seven dollars each. The gentleman who had made the purchase explained this apparent discrepancy by dwelling on the alleged fact that shoats at this season of the year are very

scarce. And now comes the strangest part of the story. Christian Kauffman, a farmer and prominent member of the Amish church at the Gap, bought from the same inspector, at the very time the latter was apposed to be negotiating for the pur chase of shoats, six of the ten shoats belonging to the inspector at the astonishing tigure of four collars each. The four re-maining shoats, recruited by two others which must have cost him less four dollars each (else he than would not have sold at that figure

to Kaufiman) he disposed of to the county at the rate of seven dollars apiece. Here it will be observed the stern guardian of prison discipline made an aggregate profit on the shoats of upwards of eighteen dollars, twelve of which he made at the expense of the county. In view of facts like this it might be well to suggest to the prison keeper that reform, like charity, should begin at home, and if the suggestion may be pardoned it might be advisable to make "sheats" ineligible as prison inspectors.
