Fatai Flames at Contesville Caused by a COATESVILLE, Pa., Feb. 23 .- By the explosion of a lamp in the Rokely paper mills of J. A resolution was adopted to give preference to the present stockholders to purchase the additional stock at par at the quota of one new share of stock for each ten shares now held by them.
