#### About Peaches.

Germantown Telegraph. Edwin Satterthwaite, of Jenkintown, in the adjoining county of Montgomery, who is as well-posted on fruit-culture as any one in the commonwealth, read a paper at the late annual convention of the state fruit growers' association, in which the subject of peaches and peach-growing is discussed. He refers to no less than sixtyfive varieties which he has grown, and gives the relative hardiness of the trees. He says that he has not seen that the exposure and locality had anything to do with the bearing of the trees, but that old trees did much the best. He has no good word for the early varieties of peaches which invariably rotted upon the trees by the time they were fit to be gathered. As to hardiness he recommends Amelia, Beer's Smock, Bilyeu's Late Comet, Creekett's Late, Early Louise, Early Rivers, Golden Eagle, Hale's Early, Hark-er's Seedling, Leatherbrey Late, Late Admirable, Nanticoke, Price's Late, President, Prince of Wales, Smock, Snow, Thurber and Troth's Early.

He can offer no good reason why the early varities should bear abundant crops of perfect fruit, and utterly rot at the time when they should be marketed. As to the "yellows," he appears to be

as much in the dark as others, though many assume to know a great deal about this disease, but have never shown that their assumptions have been realized. Mr. Satterthwaite is doubtless correct in his opinion, that the extirpation of the disease has nothing to do with the removal of the roots. That the affected trees should be removed, and as promptly as possible, is a generally admitted opinion; but he shows how utterly impracticable the removal of the roots would be, if even they had anything to do with the propagation of the disease, when it is known, as he has himself proved it to be the case, that in some instances these roots run a hundred feet! The fact is, as Mr. S. impliedly admits, the cause and cure of the disease have yet to be discovered, and in the meantime we must fight it with whatever weapons the occasion may offer and may seem to be defective.

#### To Destroy the Sparrows. Germantown Telegraph.

A Chester county subscriber inquires the best way he can destroy the house | CORN AND BUNION PLASTER. sparrows without shooting them. He has tried trappings, but he finds it a slow process, &c. However, should he desire to get rid of them, poison them now when there are no other birds, by placidg screenings, canary-seeds or bread crumbs, soaked in arsenic water, and scatter on a roof where the poultry cannot share it.
