SEED LEAF AND HAVANA.

United States Tobacco Journal. The market evinced some improvement notwithstanding the interference with business by Washington's birthday. There was a good inquiry for all kinds of stock, but the high prices which still rule for the remaining portion of the so-called "fine" Pennsylvania prevent any but very limited investments in this commodity. Medium and low Pennsylvania sells easily at from 12 to 18 cents. Anything at higher figures can only be disposed of in small lots to stray buyers. Either those holding Pennsylvania at 22 to 24 cents will have to reduce figures or they will have to wait till the low and medium grades have been swept from the market It is not
