About Coroner's Fees.

ED. INTELLIGENCER: The bills of Danly Shiller and Charles Wolfe were allowed, "as usual," the former by two county commissioners and the latter by the supreme court. These were two great victories in one day against all protest; yet I think it was very much like barking at the wolf and complaining because he takes the chickens. Some people can be liberal with others' money, to gain a bubble reputation with county for costs; but Commissioner Hildebrand is not one of those who pay out the county money, without some satisfaction that it is first right to do so; hence, we find him signing the warrants for the payment of the physicians, who made post-mortem examinations, but withholding his signature to "Honest Danly's" bills—although there was no attachment filed against them. We are told that the commissioners were satisfied that Danly had paid the jurors before they approved his bills. Mr. Hildebrand does not appear to be so well satisfied, and I believe he is one of our county commissioners. There is a standing resolution on the minutes of the commissioners, which was published in all the daily papers, to the effect that, in future, all bills presented by the coroner should lie over until the Monday one week from the time of presentation, before being presented. This resolution was last Monday retroacted through, in opposition to this resolve, I am at a loss to understand. But these commissioners were "satisfied the jurors had been paid." The former commissioners were not as easily satisfied, and appealed from the award of arbitrators in favor of Isaac Mishler on a claim for \$12.57. At the second trial—the first having been satisfied by defendant—Mr. Mishler admitted on the witness stand, that, according to a custom, he had paid the jurors but 50 cents on the dollar and treated the jurors, whilst in some instances the jurors took nothing at all. The court decided that there could be no recovery for what had not been paid out (although the jurors may return their verdict, "that we find that Wm. Bannick called, and was killed through dying and we have been paid our fees"). If the county commissioners continue to pay these fees without regarding my protests, I must take it like the Wolfe protesters and abide my time.
