## THE TOBACCO MARKET.

SEED LEAF AND HAVANA.

For the Week Ending Saturday, March United States Tobacco Journal. The revival of activity in manufacturing circles a few weeks ago has proved only temporary. Dullness and quietness again prevail in most of our large shops. The uncertainty of the tax question and the precarious state of business in the South are given as the cause. Consequently our leaf market is without inanimation, and transactions are few and far between. Nevertheless there is no concession as regards prices on the part of holders, except on very inferior goods. A prominent resweating firm advertises elsewhere that they will bring inferior '80 New York Big Flats to a state of pertection by a resweating process. It is to be hoped that their efforts will be successful and that thus several unfortunate holders of such stock will be relieved of their burden. For fine '80 New York state several offers were made during the week, but no sales are reported. For fine

'80 Pennsylvania the demand is good. It has been quite largely examined, but in spite of the demand the sales seem to be very small, by reason of its unsatisfactory yield which is wholly out of proportion to the prices demanded. There appears to be no help for the manufacturers except either to buy it or stop manufacturing. The market is very bare of fine wrappers, which will cause the '81 to be taken hold of unusually early by the trade. Already there are reports of changes of ownership of two packings of '81 Wisconsin Havana seed, and also of several hundred cases of Connecticut seconds, but this may be only an effect of the pulling of wires by brokers' all of whom are busily engaged in securing promises of preference from packers con cerning the first exhibition of their samples to their (the brokers') customers. The unsatisfactory state of business at

#### The Mississippl's Overflow.

Not So Isad as if Has Been Pictured-The Water Slowly Receding.

The chief state engineer says that the overflow in Louisiana covers a large part of the rear lands of East Carroll, Madison, Tensas, Concordia, and large areas in West Carroll, Morehouse, Richland, Quachita, Caldwell, Franklin and Catahoula, and is caused by the Mississippi river water escaping through the broken levees in Chicot and Desha counties in Arkansas, below the mouth of the Red river. A large territory is being overflowed by the Point Coupee crevasse, which is likely to in crease in depth and extent. There is also much overflow along the Red river bot-tom, and in every parish on the Mississippi. The annual production of cotton alone in the parishes overflowed is fully 300,000 bales, valued at \$15,000,000. News from Helena, Ark., says that the

river is falling, and that the levees are believed to be safe. The break below is backing the overflow on the city, and the water in the overflowed districts rose seven inches yesterday, but as this rise may go down in a few days no alarm is

The Vicksburgh Herald says : "The sit uation of the people of the valley is bad enough without its being exaggerated. The sensations that have been printed and pictured of the situation have, in our opinion, done great harm. Where crevasses have occurred, the land, or a greater portion of it, is for the time being lost. There are very many persons of the valley uninjured as yet. We have no doubt that fair crops will be raised in almost all portions of the valley. While people in many places are inconvenienced and losing some of their livestock, they are not in such a dreadful plight as has been described, as there are two months before cotton time is past, and the water is almost sure to subside in time to raise crops."

The Marksville Review says: "But what of these overflows that carry so much dread with them? Do they not enrich the land, and are not heavier crops made upon them? We incline to the opinion that, in point of fact, inundations are beneficial."

At the request of Gov. McEnery, the secretary of war has telegraphed instructions to the commissary of New Orleans to purchase and deliver 100,000 rations to commissioners already appointed by the governor for the relief of the sufferers by the flood. The secretary has also directed that 10,000 additional rations be delivered to Commissioner Wilson at Mound City.

Ill., for the relief of sufferers at that point Many of the colored people in Bolivar county will not leave their homes, though offered free passage northward. They can be seen in large numbers sitting on platforms on top of their houses with the water rushing six inches below them, and nothing can induce them to leave. Hundreds probably have been washed away and drowned. It is the most disastrous flood in the Mississippi river occurring in a hundred years. At Memphis the river is higher than it was in 1815.
