Testing Tobacco Seeds. Country Gentleman.

It is more necessary to test tobacco seeds before sowing the plant bed than any other seed planted by the farmer. They are very small and easily affected by extreme cold and moisture, and by frost, after being sown. Take a small piece of cotton batting, wet it thoroughly, and place in a teacup or goblet, and scatter thereon half a teaspoonful of tobacco seeds. The cotton should be kept moist with tepid water, and if the seed is good it will sprout in a few days. I do not regard this, however, as a sure test, for I have been unable to germinate seed in this way which sprouted when sown in the plant bed. Old seed will sprout sooner than new, and is by many preferred. The question is often asked at what age tobacco seed loses its power to germinate. I have heard many answers to this question. Some seedsmen and growers say at 10 years; others at 20. The largest grower of tobacco seed in this country, who deals in only one variety (White Burleigh), and harvested last season 5,000 pounds of tobacco, claims to have grown the crop from seed 13 years old. Major Ragland, of Virginia, who doubtless exports more to-bacco seed than any other grower or seed firm in this country, and whose crop averages from 30 to 50 bushels yearly, thinks that very old seed may be sown.

Another way to test the seed is to throw a little into the fire or on the stove. If it snaps it is said to be good; if it does not, it is called poor. It is a common custom now with many growers not to sow dry seed, scattering it directly from the hand or mixed with ashes, plaster, sand or loam, on the plant bed, but to partially or wholly sprout it in the house before sowing it on the bed. There are so many ways of preparing the seed in this manner that I cannot describe them all but will that I cannot describe them all, but will allude to'a few of them. The plan recently adopted of taking two or more sods about the size of a common shovel, and about two or three inches thick, sprinkling seed upon it, is a very good way, and is said to be almost a sure method of ascertaining the germinating power of the seed. Moistén the back of the sod with tepid water, and then scatter seed thereon; place in a warm room and cover with a light cloth.

The better way to sprout the seed (I think) is to obtain from the trunk of a de cayed apple tree a quantity of rotten wood (that which is fine and light) and place in a shallow box or old milk pan and mix the seed well with the wood mould. Moisten and keep in a warm place. If the seed is good it will be sure to germinate. Be careful not to sow too early, since after sprouting, the young seedlings grow very fast, and often if too forward when being sown in the bed, break and are thereby damaged. At the south some growers sow the seed in the plant patch in the fall, and we have known growers in the Connecticut valley to do the same, but it is not the common way and we can hardly advocate the practice. Our growers do not usually make plant beds enough; some sow only one bed, and if that one fails to yield plants, we are forced to buy or beg, and in either case have to wait until others have finished "setting."
Havana seed is tikely "to come," and when they once appear on the surface, grow very fast. They literally crowd one another in the bed and grow less "stocky" or spreading than seed leaf plants.
