THE TOBACCO MARKET.

LOCAL MATTERS OF INTEREST. Trade Active-Buyers Busy-Good Leaf Get ting Scarce-Some Recent Sales

and Deliveries, There was more activity in the local tobacco market during the past week than there had been previously for a month or two. A score or more of buyers have been scouring the county and picking up alf the desirable lots they could lay their hands on, and paying pretty good prices. too. It is now an open secret that good leaf is getting scarce in the hands of growers, and that buyers who held back in hopes of a decline in prices have been disappointed and are willing to pay to-day prices at which they pooh-poohed earlier in the season. While a few of the "early birds," who bought the crops as they grew on the field in September last, have been bitten here and there, a majority of them are well satisfied with their ventures, while those who bought in January and paid as high as 25 and 30 cents for fine wrappers, boast that their purchases are much cheaper than those now being gathered in at 12 and 15 cents. A few weeks more of active trade will suffice to clean up that part of the crop of 1881 remaining in the hands of growers.
