A Doubtful Decision.

The Centre county court has just n

a decision that will not prove very acceptable to the politicians. An editor sued a man who was a candidate for office, and after the election refused to pay for the complimentary notices which had been given of him during the campaign. It was admitted that the complimentary editorials were not ordered by the candidate, but the court held that a political paper is expected to do its utmost in furthering the interests of its candidates, and that in return the parties so served are bound to pay the editor for his labor. This is a new departure in political finance which, if generally enforced, would work hard on the defeated candidate.-New Era.

In the absence of the text of this alleged decision, we are loth to believe that any enlightened court in this commonwealth has pronounced a judgment so utterly at variance with every legal Sherman left the treasury department he and common sense principle as that which is here ascribed to the judicatory in which Judges Orvis and Mayer are arbiters of the law. It is well established that without a promise, express or implied, no obligation to pay can be contracted by the voluntary act of one party to the assumed contract and that party the obligee. If a candidate for office can be held liable to pay for " complimentary editorials" inserted in a newspaper without his order, the same principles which sustain this view of the law will compel business men to pay for complimentary notices of their interests inserted in newspapers without their direction. Of course, the supreme court would promptly reverse any such absurd Judgment of the Centre county court or any other.

John T. Adams, ex-member of the Connecticut Legislature and ex-judge of probate, died in Norwich on Thursday night aged 75 years.

James A. Patton, judge of the court of appeals of West Virginia, died suddenly night.

Henry W. Eastman, a well-known lawyer of New York city, died on Thursday night at his home in Roslyn, Long Island.

General Streinikoff Murdered. In Odessa, Gen. Strelnikoff, the public prosecutor of the Kieff military tribunal, was shot with a revolver, while sitting on the boulevard. The ball penetrated the head and came out through the forehead. General Streinikoff died immediately. The two assassins were stopped while fleeing from the scene in a carriage, offered violent resistance and with their revolvers and poniards wounded three persons. They were finally overpowered and conveyed to a police station.

Wounded his Wife and Killed Himself. In Cleveland, Ohio, Robert Bluen, a blacksmith, fired twice at his wife, who was lying in bed beside him, and wounded her dangerously in the head. He then committed suicide by putting a bullet into his own brain. They had only been six months married and he was supposed to be devoted to his wife, but he had been disabled by rheumatism and feared poverty. Pow-Wows Played Out.
