

THE TOBACCO MARKET.

SEED LEAF AND HAVANA. For the Week Ending Saturday, April 1, 1882. United States Tobacco Journal. Though there was a much improved inquiry for suitable stock during the week, business is still lagging. Manufacturers are in a state of trouble. The tax question is still in a state of uncertainty; the system of a tenement house cigar manufacture will probably be stopped by law; imported tobacco may be allowed to come in free of duty, and the South is just now a very poor field for enterprises of any kind. Consequently, the manufacturing of cigars is being carried on in an ostentatious way. All these drawbacks did not exist last year, and nevertheless, manufacturers remained without much business till the middle of April. The consumption of cigars certainly has not decreased, and we venture to say that without the just named causes business would be quite brisk. The quietness has now lasted nearly three months. Jobbers certainly must have a greatly reduced stock on hand, and orders will and must come in very shortly. The settlement of the tax and other disturbing questions is quite near, so that we may look forward to a speedy revival of the cigar business. The natural consequence will be a stimulated market and goods of all kinds will move freely. Though we advise holders of old and fine goods not to be too stiff in their prices and sell at reasonable offers, holders of new and fine goods may rest assured that an open and profitable market is in store for them.

The stock of old leaf in our market is gradually decreasing. Pennsylvania, from 12 to 15 cents, sells easily, while the figures asked for fine running, 22 to 24 cents, are frightening prospective buyers and cause them to purchase in very limited quantities only. Connecticut moves also in small parcels only, and at no higher nor lower figures than those that ruled last fall. Several attempts have again been made during the past two weeks to excite the market on New York state tobacco, but owing to the clamorous and the astute behavior of the investigator, the attempts proved a ridiculous failure. Ohio is much in demand by contractors of cheap cigars, and sales are effected with ease. There is very little Wisconsin in the market, and offerings meet with eager takers. The sales of the week were as follows:

Pennsylvania—Crop '80, 500 cases; 12 to 15 cents for low and medium running. Connecticut—Crop '80, 250 cases; some seconds at 12 to 13 cents, balance wrappers at 27 to 45 cents. Ohio—Crop '80, 500 cases, 4 to 10 cents. Havana—Market active. Sales, 1,000 bales. Prices firm.

Gains Report. Sales of seed leaf tobacco reported by J. S. Gans' Son & Co., tobacco brokers, No. 131 Water street, New York, for the week ending April 3, 1882. 650 cases 1880 Pennsylvania—fillers; 6 to 6 1/2, assorted, 10 to 16. 100 cases 1880 New England, 12 to 30. 100 cases 1880 State, private terms. 250 cases 1880 Ohio fillers, 4 to 4 1/2, assorted, 6 to 10. 100 cases 1880 Wisconsin—3 to 12. Total 1,300 cases.

Losses by Fire. The Eleanor Springs hotel, at Haysville, twelve miles from Pittsburgh, the property of D. H. Tompkins, of Pittsburgh, has been totally destroyed by fire. The building was a handsome frame structure, containing one hundred and fifty rooms, and with the furniture, was valued at \$138,000. Fortunately there were no boarders in the hotel when the fire occurred, as the season had not yet commenced. The origin of the fire is believed to have been incendiary, as flames were discovered in three different portions of the house at once. The loss is partially covered by insurance.

A lad employed by the Philadelphia sewing machine company, which occupies the second and a portion of the third floor of the rough-cast three-story building at the northwest corner of Thirteenth and Buttonwood streets, while building a fire in a stove in the janitor's room on the second floor, put some kerosene on the stove to hasten the progress of the flames. Some of the burning liquid fell to the floor and in a few minutes the entire building was in flames. The company employs thirty-three men, who were barely able to escape with their lives. The loss amounting to \$20,000. The sewing machine company was insured for \$9,500.
