# A Man Who Flops Over a Bridge and Don't

John Schmitt, a German aged 34 years, Conestoga creek, this morning between 9 and 10 o'clock. Schmitt lauded in this country in 1871, and of late he has been tramping around the country. Fifteen days ago be was committed to prison, probably for drunk-eness, although he says he had himself sent out to get out of the cold. This morning he walked out to the bridge and he says, as he has been greatly troubled of late, he concluded to put an end to his life by jumping over the bridge. When he touched the water, however, he quickly "pulled for the shore" and did not give himself much time to pass away from this sunny clime. When Schmitt was asked how high it was at the place where he jumped, he said : "Well I found when I landed that it was higher than I supposed it was when I started from the top." The man told several persons that he was tired of living and he no doubt thought he could die easily in that way. When he found that the water was not deep and that he had received a wetting, he probably came to his senses and thought better of this world.


