#### Tasteful Decorations and Impressive Services.

The Easter services at the Moraviau church were, as usual, of an attractive and interesting character. They commenced at 71 o'clock Saturday evening, with a love least, and Easter Eve vigils, to commemorate the watching the tomb of the Saviour before his resurrection. At six o'clock Sunday morning the Easter liturgy was prayed, and the account of the resurrection of Christ was read from the harmony of the gospels. There was no sermon or address at the early service, but the church was very beautifully decorated with growing flowers, ferns, vines, foliage plants, evergreens and cut flowers, some of which were wrought into elegant and appropriate designs. Around the edge of the platform, ou which the pulpit and reading desk stand, were arranged long circular rows of potted flowers of every choice variety. Behind these was built a rockery with a base about four feet in diameter. From the crevices of the rocks arose a grand pyramid of flowers of every description, most happily blended with ferns, coleus, smilax and other vines. From the centre of the pyramid arose a floral shaft, on which was placed the Christian crown, composed of golden flowers and surmounted by a golden cross. A mass of dark green geraniums formed a fitting and effective background. The marble tablet. commemorative of the late Bishop David Bigler, was also prettily decorated.

At 10:30 a. m. the Easter Litany was read, and the pastor, Rev. J. Max Hark, preached a sermon on the Resurrection, taking his text from 1st Cor. 15th chapter and 17th and 18th verses. The musical portion of the service was very fine, Prof. Wm. B. Hall having kindly volunteered to lead the lately reorganized choir.

In the evening the children's Easter service was given, and notwithstanding the inclement weather the church was filled. The service opened with a grand procession of children, filing from the lecture room into the church and marching through the several aisles, singing the story of the resurrection. After an invocation by the pastor, there followed a very pretty service arranged especially for the occasion. The superintendent asks, "What assurance have we that Christ is risen ?" The question is answered successively by one memor of each of the thirteen classes, and as the auswers were given the pupils stepped forward and placed a floral letter on a large auchor placed upon the platform. When the letters were all placed they formed the words " CHRIST IS RISEN." As the answers were given and the letters successively placed, the members of the different classes recited passages from the scriptures confirmation

# INCENDIARY FIRES.

A House Damaged in the City and Another

Destroyed in the County. Yesterday morning about one o'clock an alarm of fire was sounded from box 64 at Low and Rockland street, caused by a fire in an unoccupied house of John Brickner, at 220 Low street. The whole fire depart ment was soon on hand, the hese cart of company No. 3 being on the ground in four minutes after the alarm -was struck. They were closely followed by that engine and the remainder of the department, including truck A, were not long in getting there. A stream was put on the building by engine No 3, the other companies being sent home by the chief engineer, and the fire was extinguished in a short time. The fire was the work of an incendiary, and the parties who started it, after effecting an entrance applied the match in a closet under the stairway leading to the second floor. It burned the steps away and through into the partition on the east side of the building, making its way to the roof in which a small hole was burned. There is an insurance of \$500 on the build. ing in a company represented by Mr. B.F. Shenk. The loss will be about \$50. The chief engineer desires it stated to persons holding keys that they should but strike the alarm once, as that is sufficient to bring out the department.

A small frame house belonging to Aunie Withers, near Mount Eden church, Eden township, was destroyed by fire on Thurs day night. James Scott had just moved out the day before and another party was to have moved in on the day it burned. Cause of the fire is unknown. We have not learned the amount of loss or whether there was an insurance.
