ANOTHER SUIGIDE. Cirristian Borne Hangs Himself.

Christian Borne, who resides on West Walnut street, between Mulberry and Charlotte, committed suicide about noon to-day by hanging himself in the garret of easter. his house. The deceased was a huckster by occupation and peddled fish, vegetables, &c. For some time past he has been drinking very heavily and was intoxicated his neighbors. He procured a heavy rope stairs and called him, but received no answer. lie then went to the garret and found him hanging to a strip between the rafters. SUCCESSFUL SURGERY.

One Eye Removed to save the Other. Some time during last December, Mr. Joseph Bresch, who was one of the stone masons employed on the new bridge being erected by the Pennsylvania railroad company across the New Holland pike near the residence of B. J. McGrann, esq., was struck in the eye with a piece of stone while at work. The eyeball was badly cut by the stone, a piece of which lodged within it. The eye was so seriously injured that it was impossible to save it; and in order to prevent the other eye from becoming affected by sympathetic irritation, it became necessary to remove the injured organ. The operation was successfully performed on last Tuesday by Dr. C. H. Browe, of this city. Mr. Bresch is now rid of a painful and useless eye, and expects soon to be able to be at work

SHIPHERD'S STORY.

MORE FROM THE PERUVIAN AGENT What the Witness Understood From Secre tary Slaine's Marginal Note to Minis-

ter Hurlbut, "Go in, Steve." WASHINGTON, D. C., April 14.-The Shipherd investigation was continued this morning. Witness said the subject of the war with Chili was never discussed with Blaine or Blair. The question of war was never mentioned in connection with the Landrean claims. Witness was not aware that General Grant ever wrote, it was time the United States

Witness declined to say what he meant by the statement that "He was awaiting whatever course Mr. Blaine might pursue when he (Shipherd) might have something to say." Witness said there were grave reasons why Blaine did not give his (witness') letter to the attorney general for criminal action, but did not state the rea-

Witness declined to state what passed between him and President Arthur when he presented Gen. Grant's letter of introduction. The conversation had relation to the Peruvian company, but what relation witness refused to state. Witness or his associates never entertained the slightest suspicion of a war with Chili. Witness' impression as to the meaning

of the marginal note "Go in, Steve" was that the wishes of the department were that Hurlbut should go on in the course he was pursuing, regardless of the text of the dispatch Witness declined to state whether the draft of instructions which General Grant

endorsed had any allusions to the possibility of a war with Chili. Witness stated he had never received any autograph letter from Blaine and all his correspondence with the secretary has been published.

Witness' further examination was postoned until to-morrow. Adjourned.

SCARLET FEVER.

Malignant Type Raging in Berks County PHILADELPHIA, April 14.—With regard to alarming rumors of an epidemic of scarlet fever in Berks county a special dispatch from Allentown this afternoon says: Since January last a malignant form of scarlet fever has been raging in Boyertown, situated in the lower end of Berks county, with a population of over 2,000. For a few weeks there was an average of two or three deaths daily in the borough and vicinity, and at present time there is but little abatement. It is not an unusual thing to witness three or four funerals in one day. Last week there were thirteen deaths from scarlet fever, and up to this time nine have been reported this week. The disease is not confined to children only, but quite a number of grown persons have been afflicted with fatal results. In most cases death follows immediate vicinity.

FIRE RECORD.

Lunatic Asylum Burned Near Austin, Texas GALVESTON, Texas, April 14.-A special dispatch from Austin to the News says : One of the buildings of the lunatic asylum situated two miles and a half from this town, was burned yesterday. The building was a one story brick structure and

cost \$12,000. Sow Mills Burned by Incentiaries. EAST SAGINAW, Mich., April 14—The saw mills of Herbert Thomas, at Chase, Lake county, were totally destroyed by fire. The night watchman claims that he was confronted by three masked men, two of whom held held him while the third fired the mill. Loss, \$20,000; partially

insured. Disastrons flames at Lebanon Mo. LEBANON, Mo., April 14-A fire last night destroyed a whole block of business houses here involving a loss of \$60,000. The principal losers are W. A. Spillar, \$20,000, insurance \$10,000; and C. T. Walter, \$6,000, no insurance. The other losses range from \$500 to \$3,500.

Twenty-two missionaries are going to Europe to labor in Great Britain, Denmark and Switzerland, and the remaining will go to points in the south and east of the United States. These thirty-three are the advance guard of about two hundred who are soon to start on a similar mis-

News from the Seat of Government. WASHINGTON, April 14 .- The secretary of war to-day directed 200,000 additional rations be issued to the commissioners at New Orleans for the benefit of the sufferers of the flood in Louisiana.

All strikers who applied for back pay this forenoon and refused to return to work, were paid and discharged. 
