Plymouth Rocks.

A correspondent of the New England Farmer, who has been experimenting with Plymouth Rock chickens, gives the result in the sale of eggs and pullets during the past year. Flock No. 1, contained 15 hens, produced 1,498 eggs, at a cost of \$38.56, from which an income of \$56.87 was derived, equal to \$1.22 per average c.gs per hen, Flock No. 2 contained 18 hens, produced 1.826 eggs; expense, \$56.-28; income \$81.08, an average of \$1.43 eggs per hen, 190.-Flock No. 3, contained 27 hetis, produced 2,712 eggs, an average of 100 per hen; expenses, \$83.51 income, \$109.78 per hen, an average of 97 cents. Many chicken raisers prefer other breeds to the Piymouth Rocks. Those of smaller size, such as the Black Spanish, Pheasant and Dominique, all excellen layers, are preferred by many, as it costs much less for their keep.

Bangerous Cats.
