Germantown Telegraph. We notice that the spade in gardenwork is still considerably used; and the knowledge that the spade has been in a great measure superseded by the fork has not traveled near as much as it ought to have done. We see many a one "digging garden" and preparing for spring, spade in hand, utterly unconscious that with a modern digging fork a man can do as much in a day, and with far less fatigue, what with an old-fashioned spade it would take him two days to do. In the use of a fork there is no digging to do. The tines run into the earth by the downward descent of the fork in the operator's hands alone; and in throwing over and leveling, a single blow of the tines is enough to pulverize and make a level surface. Some say their land is too light-that the earth passes through and they cannot take up a forkful; but in this case work it when i is a little wet. Even sandy ground can be dug with a fork, if the proper time is chosen for it. Of course the spade can never be abandoned. There will always be some ground that is very weedy, or full of roots which a sharp edge like that of a spade will be necessary to sever; and in digging up trees and garden vegetables, nothing can replace the spade in business; but there are a number of instances in garden work where a digging fork can come into very great labor saving. Soaking Seed Against Smut.

Most good farmers have reported their experience in favor of soaking seed-corn in weak brine before planting, as a pre ventive of smut, though not always with the sanction of what are known as advanced agriculturists. They have not been able to understand how anything that can be done to a seed will have any effect on what is to happen to the grain that is produced months afterwards. However, those farmers who have tried it have adhered to the the practice, and we suppose there is nothing more certain than that these brine steeps do prevent the smut. Latterly, however, Professor Brewer, of Yale college, not only admits that it is good practice, but shows us the process by which the smut progresses from its first establishment on the grain to its final maturity in the head or ear. It appears that the seeds or spores of the fungus adhere by a sticky coat to the grain. As soon as the grain sprouts, the fungus spore sprouts also and sends its filaments into the plant, growing as the plant grows, and continuing to grow until the grain is about to re produce itself, when the fungus plant is also ready to reproduce itself, which it does in the form of smut as we see it the smut being a nest of spores ready for reproduction. The process is made very clear. We see how brine is useful. It destroys the fungus spores, but not the grain. As corn-planting is now upon us it is the easiest thing for farmers to give this a trial. At times the damage done by smut is very serious. Manuring Corn in the Hill.

It seems scarcely credible that such a good old-fashioned custom as manuring corn in the hill should be called in question; but we see that quite a lively discussion occurred recently, and there was a disposition to decide that it was better to . spread the manure all over the land equally, then plant the corn in the hills and let it take care of itself. If one has a good supply of manure and can afford to give the whole ground a thorough dressing it may do very well to let the hills alone; but we are quite sure that where the sup ply of manure is limited, it will be found far better to put a part of it at least in the hill before dropping the corn, and we have little doubt but that even when the whole surface is abundantly manured, it would still pay in many cases to manure in the

We noticed some time ago the experiments made in one of the German experimental farms on small and large seeds. Small seeds, like small potato eyes, never produce as good crops as large seed, although the ground in quality may be equally rich. If even the mere size of a seed gives it an advantage in its first start in life, how much more valuable must be a good stock of nutritious food ready to hand as soon as the young plant is in a condition to use it? It is indeed their first early start in life which makes all the difference between a good crop and a poor one. If plants once get behind, it is very hard for them to pull up again. There are but a few mouths of growing time and a good start is a great gain. For the same reason, it is an error to

bury manure in the ground at any time, when the crop is an annual one to be sowed in the spring and taken off in the fall. And yet this is a very common practice. Manure is spread on the surface, plowed down and the seed sown on the surface with the manure several inches away. It would be far better in most cases to plow the ground first, and then spread the manure on the surface and harrow it before sowing the seed. It is probable that most persons are

aware of this, and would follow the practice were it not for the additional labor involved. By manuring in advance the hauling can be done when we are not busy; in the other case it must be done at once, no matter how badly work may drive us before we can sow the seed; and then it is so much easier to haul over solid ground than over ground newly plowed. It is therefore good farming very often to sacrifice a little of what in some senses may be the best plan, for that great principle-economy of time-which is often of far more importance in farm profits. So with this discussion about manuring corn in the hill. Whether it is a good policy to manure corn in the hill, is altogether a practical question; but as to actual advantages of the practice in itself, we think there ought to be no difference of opinion whatever.
