English writers treat it more superficially, and in American colleges generally it is confined to a few lectures on taste, or on the fine arts.

But it is rather on the practical side that the subject is possessed of interest for people generally. Shut out the fine arts from the sphere of human life, and one hemisphere of its enjoyment would be gone. What would the world be without a Homer, a Shakespeare, a Milton, Tennyson and Longfellow! Without the sweet strains of music that come to sooth and satisfy the spirit! Or the master productions in painting, sculpture and architecture !
