The Mileage and Commitment Que Further Discussed

tember. Mr. Greider said it appeared from the constables' bills that they had traveled 1,491 miles in making their arrest of these men, while in their testimony it was shown they were all brought in in one or two days, from a point only a few miles

Alderman Spurrier said he had nothing to do in fixing the officers mileage. They made their return under oath, and he, in making out their bills, had charged just what they swore to.

Mr. Greider.-The trouble is that the officers appeared to know nothing about their own mileage, but put the responsi-bility upon the alderman, while the alder-man knows nothing about it, except what is on the constables' returns.

Mr. Greider asked the alderman whether Mr. Musselman and Dr. Musser made complaints against the individuals that the record showed they made complaints

Alderman Spurrier answered that they did; some of the complaints were made and signed before the arrests were made and some of them afterwards. The com plainants did not know the names of the gang ; the alderman knew some of them, and ascertained the names of the others after the arrest. He wanted to call attention to the fact that of the 19 men arrested, against whom 39 complaints had been entered, only 22 of the cases were

Mr. Greider and Alderman Spurrier had a long conversation, in which various questions were asked and answered, but nothing new developed, and the board adjourned until Tuesday morning next.

STANDING ASIDE JURORS.

The Practice in our Local Courts. The deliberation of the supreme court over the point raised in the Lister Smith case as to the power of the commonwealth to stand aside jurors, the Philadelphia News is collecting opinions from the judges of the state as to the practice in their courts. The universal response is that no such power is exercised.

Judge Livingston of this county writes to the News: "We do not stand aside jurors in cases of misdemeanor. I am not are that such practice ever pro this court.'

Judge Patterson says: "I have never known that practice to prevail in this county and I asked my colleague, the president judge, and he says the same. To allow the commonwealth in the trial of misdemeanors to stand aside jurors without cause has, I am quite certain, never been the case here. In capital cases it has been, but even in such cases it seems to me to an infringe on the act of assembly, yet in such the practice of permitting the com-monwealth to stand aside seems too well established to question at this day. In the trial of misdemeanors I would not permit it. I may add that our oldest lawyers have no recollection that ever the commonwealth made a claim here for the excreise of such power.
