THE PITTSBURGH "COMMERCIAL-GAZETTE" CONVICED IN THE COFFROTH CASE.

In Somerset yesterday the exciting trial of the commonwealth vs. Jonah King and N. P. and G. W. Reid, editors and publishers of the Pittsburgh Commercial-Gazette, for criminal libel, ended at noon in a verdict of guilty in manifold and aggravated manner. Gen. Coffroth was the prosecutor, and the libel consisted in an allegation made in a Washington special published in the paper in February last. The special alleged that it had been discovered that General Coffroth had while in Congress, as chairman of the committee on pensions, been in the habit of writing to applicants for pensions in his district; that he had urged forward their papers so that their cases would speedily be settled and pensions allowed, while in fact he had done nothing in the matter, but left all the papers in a confused mass, which his successor on the committee was unable to reduce to order.

Immediately after the publication Gen. Coffroth instituted a criminal suit for libel in the court of common pleas against the proprietors of the paper. The defendant did not endeavor to establish the truth of the statement, but put the author of the telegram on the stand, who testified that he received the information from Gen. J. M. Campbell, Gen. Coffroth's successor, and that the matter was telegraphed to him with faith and without malice. This defense did not seem adequate to the jury, as a verdict of guilty was rendered in half an hour after retirement. Gen. William H. Kountz, and A. J. Colborn assisted the prosecution and in the defense was conducted by Maj. A. M. Brown, of Pittsburgh. If it is believed by the defendants that the question of costs had influence in deciding the case, as the jury was told to put a large amount of costs of the county and the large number of witnesses from abroad made the cost heavy. A motion for a new trial was entered at once, and the defendants returned to Pittsburgh.
