Senator Blair—How do you reconcile this with the letter of Mr. Robert Christy to Mr. Blair, in which he states that he is the attorney for the Landreau claim and the only person authorized to act for it?

Answer—None, whatever; I certainly would have heard it if anything of the kind was said.

During the recess session of the committee it was decided by a vote of members present that the cross examination of Senator Blair should be conducted first by Representative Blount, of Georgia; second, by Representative Rice, of Massachusetts; and third by Representative Belmont, of New York.

THE FIGHT WITH THE INDIANS. Garcia's Victory a Death Blow to the Outbreak in Arizona. SAN FRANCISCO, May 4.—A Londoning, N. M., dispatch states it is positively ascertained that in the light on the 29th ultimo between the Mexican troops under Col. Garcia and Loe's band of Indians, the latter lost seventy-eight killed and all their stock; also that Loe himself was killed and thirty-three Indians were taken prisoners.
