

and third by Representative Belmont, of TURBULENT STRIKERS. Ne;ro Workmen Making Trouble at New-burgh N.Y. NEWBURGH, N. Y. May 4-The trouble

among the railroad strikers at Cornwall seems to have subsided this morning, excopt among the negroes, and about eighty of them are turbulent. They severely beat a colored man last night for going back to work, and made it necessary for one of the bosses to shelter the men, and some these-about 150 men-Italians and others, went to work this morning, but the eighty negro rioters drove them away. They were able to do :o because the men were seattered about in small gangs, which were successively overpowered by the negroes. The latter are controlled by two of their number. When the officers attempted to arrest these two for whom warrants have been issued, they retired to a brick house where they have been living and barricaded the premises, setting the officers at defiance. Contractor Dean visited the works this morning and caused the men who had been driven off to resume work. It was expected the negroes would again assault the workers. Contractor Dean is now here in search

of aid and Sheriff Odell and deputies will at once proceed to the scene. The sheriff is determined to exhaust every civil power he has before resorting to extreme measures, but will call out the militia if required to quel! the disturbance. The rioting negroes belong to a gang which the contractor recently brought from the out-kirts of Baltimore.

THE FIGHT WITH THE INDIANS. Garcia's Victory a Death Blow to the Out-break in Arizona. SAN FRANCISCO, May 4 .- A Lordsburg,

N. M., dispatch states it is positively asserted that in the fight on the 29th ultimo between the Mexican troops under Col. Garcia and Loco's band of Indians, the latter lost seventy-cight killed and all their stock ; also that Loco himself was killed and thirty-three Indians were taken prisoners. The American loss is stated to have been twenty-seven killed and wounded. This info mation is from a reliable source, and if it is confirmed it may be regarded as the death blow of the present Indian outbreak which has resulted so disastrously to Arizona and New Mexico. A carefully summary shows a total of 141 whites and Mexicans killed by Indians during the past two weeks, 500 head of stock killed and captured, and the de-
