TOBACCO GROWING IN PENNSYLVANIA

The Season for Setting the Plants. " N. A. G." in Country Gentleman. In order to strengthen tobacco plants which have been raised under glass, so that they may bear transplanting to the field with little loss from the change, the sashes should be removed from the cold frames a week or more before they are large enough for setting. This will cause them to extend their rootlets, and acclimate them to out-door conditions of weather. A little neglect at this time, a regards forcing and watering, will do good rather than harm. I found, on conversing with the farmers of Lancaster county, that strong, good sized plants are consid ered indispensable for securing an even and successful planting; and this accords exactly with my own experience. There

is nothing gained in setting small, sickly

plat's. It is much better to allow the plants

to remain in the seed bed until they are of sufficient size, with leaves as large as a table-spoon or silver dollar. The time preferred for planting is from May 1 to June 20. I have seen good crops of tobacco mature with plants set out after this time, but there is danger that the plants will not have time to fully mature with later setting than this, and there is also danger, if the crop should mature, that it may be frozen in the curing barn before it is cured. It has formerly been thought advisable to set out tobacco plants in soil saturated by a heavy rainfall. Experience has proved, however, that it is preferable to set the plants in a dry or moist soil, which necessitates a greater amount of labor, but insures greater success with the planting. The reasons for this are obvious. In setting a plant with the ground wet from heavy rains, the soil becomes compacted about the stems of the plant, and when it becomes dry again, a hard crust or lump is formed, which is detrimental to healthy and rapid growth of the plants. By setting the plants in a dry or simply moist soil, and watering them afterwards, this difficulty is obviat

ed, and growth commences more quickly

than when set in wet soil. Of course, if:

shower immediately follows after the plants are set, no hand watering will be

necessary. A second watering will be necessary if the weather should be dry and

t'ie san bright. There is another important point in setting out tobacco plants which deserves to be considered. It is poor policy to get a gang of men and boys into a tobacco field to set plants. I much prefer to take a little more time for the work, and know that it is being well done. A plant poorly set out stands a poor chance to succeed, and I never yet knew a piece of tobacco to be planted by a crowd of hands but that the work was slighted. My method of setting tobacco is to prepare the soil a short time before the plants are ready to transplant, and when they have attained sufficient size, the work of planting is commenced with little regard to the weather. I prefer to set a small piece each day, performing the work, if the weather is dry, during the latter portion of the day, which gives the plants an opportunity to recruit during the coming night. Care needs to be excreised in drawing the plants from the seed-bed. The bed should be thoroughly sprinkled before the work is commenced, in order that the plants may be easily pulled without mutilating the leaves, and that the soil will the better adhere to the roots. The plants should be kept straight in the hand as they are drawn, and placed in handfuls in a shallow vessel, with the roots in the bottom and the leaves at the top. In this shape they may be kept fresh and in good condition for a number of days, provided they are kept damp and in a shady, cool place.

As soon as the plants commence to grow after having been transplanted to the field, the cultivator should be started between the rows. The growers of the weed in the Lancaster section of Pennsylvania have learned the importance of constant cultivation in their tobacco patches They do not wait for the weeds to show themselves, but commence the work as soon as the tobacco plants have taken root. The implements used for cultivating tobacco are numerous, and consist of various forms of one-horse cultivators, all of which are intended to stir and pulverize the soil between the rows of plants. Between the plants in the rows the soil must be loosened and mellowed by hand-hozing The first hoeing is usually termed " scraping." The process consists of skimming off the surface of the soil with the weeds, and replacing with mellow soil from be tween the rows. If the soil is hard about the plants where the cultivator cannot reach, it should be loosened and mellowed
