LABOR AND CAPITAL.

THE BIG STRIKE AT MILWAUKEE.

Thousands of Men Voluntarily Out of Work

-A Lock-Out at Detroit.

The questions connected with the strikes have become complicated and the excitement over them is intensified by the fact that a large number of settlers in a large tannery struck today. These men asked for an increase of wages, and being refused, immediately went out. It is claimed the place of the strikers can be filled at once, but it is believed the strike will extend to other departments of the tannery works and into the suburbs. Cigar makers have been on a strike for over five months, being supported by funds from the unions in other parts of the country. Fears are now felt that the strike will extend to other departments of business here. An army of thousands of men are now voluntarily out of work. No demonstrations of any kind have been indulged in by the iron strikers here. The men have settled down to a feeling of quiet determination. In conversation some of the leaders declared that two thousand men here were able to stand the strike for twelve months, besides having funds to send to their less fortunate brethren in other cities. Secretary Hinton, of the rolling mill company, said that the men could not have quit work at a more opportune time for the company. A year ago a strike would have entailed a great loss, but now the company is not unwilling for the men to remain out a year if they wish. While declaring their ability to remain on a strike for a year, if necessary, the majority of the strikers express confidence in settlement of the differences between themselves and their employers. What they base their hopes on is not stated, but they evidently have some reason for the belief. In Detroit, Mich., Bough's steam forge inaugurated a lock-out, beginning last Saturday. The men had intended to work till yesterday, but Bough informed them that he would employ no more union men. His action was disclosed to the unionists, who appointed a committee to see that Bough was informed that his mind was made up. Efforts will be made by the unionists to induce non-union men to quit work. The unionists who gave this information added: "It is going to be a square fight, and we can stand it as long as he can."

NOTE AND COMMENT.

In the Religious and Literary World.

President Seeley, of Amherst college, openly and publicly counsels the students of that college who are about to study for the ministry to beware of Andover, and to go to Hartford seminary.

Dr. Nevin's recent speech on foreign missions, said that he carried \$4,000 in change through the famine region in China and slept with it in his room without a guard, and although the people were starving none offered to touch a cent of it.

At Cambridge one of the pupils of Mr. Simcox was reading to him a sermon, perhaps the first he ever composed, in the course of which he came to the following passage: "Amid this tumult the son of Amram stood unmoved." "Whom do you mean by the son of Amram?" inquired the divine. "If you please, sir, I mean Moses." "Then, if you mean Moses, why do you not say Moses?" was the reply.

Rev. J. E. Richards, pastor of the Congregational church at St. John's, Mich., has been a suit for libel against Mr. Babcock, a locally noted infidel, claiming \$10,000 damages. Mr. Babcock, it is alleged, made a statement in certain circles to the effect that he believed Mr. Richardson would preach "Ingersollism" if it paid to go to the pulpit, and that he thought more of a rich man's fleece than a poor man's soul.

A Rejected Parish.

The blacksmith of a little English village got out of Richardson's novel of "Pamela, or Virtue Rewarded," and used to read it aloud on the long summer evenings, seated on his bench, and never failed to have a large and attentive audience. It is a pretty long-winded book; but the author's prolixity, and they listened to it all. At length, when the happy turn of fortune arrived, which brings the hero and heroine together and sets them living long and happily according to the most approved rules, the congregation was so delighted as to raise a great shout, and, procuring the church keys, actually set the parish bells ringing.

The Unitarians.

In Boston the other evening the annual festival of the American Unitarian Association was held at Music hall, Judge Lowell presiding. Over 900 persons sat down to the tables and the galleries were filled with spectators. The chairman, Henry H. Edes, made the opening address, introducing Judge Lowell, who delivered and eloquent speech. The platform tables were occupied by distinguished representatives of the Unitarian clergy and laity, among them Gov. Long, Dr. Oliver Wendell Holmes, the Rev. Kretzler-Jander, the Norwegian poet; the Hon. George S. Hale, Prof. Joseph Lovering, Mayor Green, Admiral Preble, Gen. Thomas Sherwin and the Rev. Mr. Dall, of Calcutta. There were a number of prominent speakers, among them Judge Lowell and Dr. Holmes, who also read a poem, which will be found in to-day's INTELLIGENCER. Letters regretting their inability to attend were received from Justice Miller, of the United States supreme court; Justices Allen and Field, of the supreme court of Massachusetts; President Eliot, of Harvard college; George William Curtis, Joseph H. Choate, and Dorman B. Eaton, of New York; the Hon. Ebenezer Rockwell Hoar, of Concord; Secretary of the Navy Chandler, of the convention, which is holding a session in Washington. Harrold is a pronounced ritualist. While debating some question before the meeting he said: "The ritualists are the only true interpreters of the Episcopal religion. For the benefit of those who wish to know, I say that I light candles on my altar during all services, use water bread for communion, pray for the souls of the departed, hear confessions and grant absolution." As a great majority of those present were low church men, the statement created quite a breeze. Hon. Montgomery Blair, of Maryland, is a delegate to the convention, denounced ritualism as "conniving at the destruction of the church," and as an insidious invasion by men who are seeking the power of the church by a violation of its constitution. Pinkney, who was present, took official notice of Harrold's remarks, but did not indicate what his future action would be.
