LABOR AND CAPITAL.

THE BIG STRIKE AT MILWAUKEE.

Thousands of Men Voluntarily Out of Work
—A Lock-Out at Detroit.

Milwankee Dispatch to the Times. The questions connected with the strikes have become complicated and the excitement over them is intensified by the fact that a large number of setters in a large tannery struck to-day. These men asked for an increase of wages, and being refused, immediately went out. It is claimed the place of the strikers can be filled at once, but it is believed the strike will extend to other departments of the tannery works and into the suburbs. Cigar makers have been on a strike for over five months, being supported by funds from the unions in other parts of the country. Fears are now felt that the strike will extend to other departments of business here. An army of thousands of men are now voluntarily out of work. No demonstrations of any kind have been indulged in by the iron strikers here. The men have settled down to a feeling of quiet determination. In conversation some of the leaders declared that two thousand men here were able to stand the strike for twelve months, besides hav-ing funds to send to their less fortunate brethren in other citics. Secretary Hinton, of the rolling mill company, said that the men could not have quit work at a more opportune time for the company. A year ago a strike would have entailed a great loss, but now the company is not unwilling for the men to remain out a year if they wish. While dc-claring their ability to remain on a strike for a year, if necessary, the majority of the strikers express confidence in a settle-ment of the differences between themselves and their employers. What they

base their hopes on is not stated, but they evidently have some reason for the belief. In Detroit, Mich., Bough's steam forge inaugurated a lock-out, beginning last Saturday. The men had intended to work till yesterday, but Bough informed them that he was out of pig-iron, and shut down.
