#### OPENING THE CAMPAIGN.

#### THE INDEPENDENTS IN PITTSBURGH.

An immense gathering of Old-Time Republi-  
cans and Solid Business Men, who  
listen to the severest arrange-  
ments of the Machine.

The meeting of the Independent Republi-  
cans in Pittsburgh yesterday was a grand  
success. It was held in Library hall and  
the place was crowded with the lead-  
ing men of both cities, all sweating until their  
rivulets ran down their faces, but all in-  
terested and ready to applaud every  
word of the speakers. The proceedings  
were opened with music by the  
Great Western band. Then Captain  
Willis McCook called the assemblage to  
order and named ex-Congressman J. E.  
Moonhead as chairman and a long list of  
solid men as vice presidents. There are  
not many firm manufacturers on the  
list, but all other leading  
industries and branches of bus-  
iness are represented by leading men.  
The list of names is as follows: In-  
dependents in the audience, General  
Moonhead stepped to the front amidst  
thunders of applause. He said he trem-  
bled when he heard his name mentioned,  
but the list of vice presidents backed him  
well as a body guard. "Two years ago,"  
he continued, "I presided at a ratification  
meeting in the opera house. It was the  
ratification of the nomination of James A.  
Garfield. [Applause, long continued.]  
That name was received then as you re-  
ceive it now. I was then and am now a  
Garfield Republican. It is Garfield Re-  
publicans who are now called Independent  
Republicans. Their duty is to remove  
evils that creep in unceremoniously.  
[Laughter.] There is one thing that I  
hope to see before I die—that is, when I  
vote for John Smith I shall not vote in  
favor of John Jones." General Moonhead  
referred in touching terms to Abraham  
Lincoln, and closed by introducing Colo-  
nel Levi Bird Duff, Independent  
candidate for lieutenant governor,  
who spoke briefly and was followed in an  
earnest speech by Col. Wm. McMichael.  
When in the course of his speech he men-  
tioned the name of Charles S. Wolfe,  
there was a perfect storm of applause.  
The cheers and clapping of hands con-  
tinued for many minutes. Later on in his  
speech Colonel McMichael referred to  
Thomas M. Marshall, and at the same  
time one man in the audience yelled:  
"Here he is!" All eyes were turned on  
Mr. Marshall, and the applause that  
greeted the incident was simply terrific.  
The audience went wild. Such enthusiasm  
was never before seen in a political  
meeting in Pittsburgh. It was fully five  
minutes before the speaker could continue  
his speech. General Moonhead invited  
Marshall to come forward, and a hundred  
citizens tried him to do so. He persisted  
and refused, but General Moonhead said  
he hoped he would yet come to the front,  
and the audience believed he would.

#### State Pharmacists in Convention.

The fifth annual meeting of the Penn-  
sylvania pharmaceutical association com-  
menced in the opera house, Altoona, yester-  
day. Mayor Howard delivered the ad-  
dress of welcome. There was a full  
representation and much interest was  
manifested. The following officers for the  
ensuing year were elected: President,  
Alonzo Robbins, Philadelphia; first vice  
president, J. B. Duble, Williamsport;  
second vice president, Charles Cresler,  
Chambersburg; secretary, Jacob A. Miller,  
Harrisburg; treasurer, Joseph L. Lember-  
ger, Lebanon; executive committee,  
Myers, Columbia; Horn, Carlisle, and  
Stein, Reading. The afternoon session  
was devoted to a discussion of the phar-  
macy bill. The association indulged in  
an excursion to Ludysville, on the Bell's  
Gap railroad, this afternoon.

#### A Coal Mine Laying Id.

Inhabitants of Smoky Hollow mining  
patch, near William Penn, were startled  
yesterday by notices served on a number of  
them to vacate their houses, as a cave-in  
was likely to occur at any time. The work  
of removing the household goods was soon  
commenced, and a general sigh of relief  
was breathed when all was taken  
away in safety. The veins at present  
worked by the Philadelphia coal com-  
pany's Packer colliery run along the  
houses, and it is said, are worked so close  
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so suddenly state that they could hear the  
blasting of rock and firing of shots un-  
derneath their homes. In some instances  
the buildings are badly shaken.

#### Great Fire in Montreal.

A terrible fire was in progress in Mon-  
treal last night in Clendinning block, Vic-  
toria Square. It originated in Miller, Son  
& Co., book binding and stationery store  
and extended to the following premises,  
all of which are now gutted: Greenfield,  
Sons & Co., dry goods; McIntyre &  
French, dry goods; Clendinning, stoves.  
Miller loses fully \$100,000; Greenfield,  
\$30,000 and McIntyre & Co., \$40,000.  
Clendinning on building and stock loses  
\$50,000. All the leading English and  
Canadian insurance offices are involved  
for three-fourths of their value.

#### The Central Pennsylvania diocese.

In March Chumk last evening the Epis-  
copal diocesan convention of Pennsylvania  
commenced its session in St. Mark's

ctor-lect of the Church of the Nativity,  
South Bethlehem, and the abolition was  
announced by Bishop M. A. DeWolf

Rev. Mr. Hall, of Trinity church, Cham-  
bersburg, made the closing prayer. After  
the service the bishop called the conven-  
tion to order and Rev. Dr. Lambertson,  
president of Lehigh University, called the  
roll of clergy and lay delegates. Nearly  
one hundred, an unusually large number  
for such an organization, answered. The  
Bishop then read a portion of his address  
and appointed the committees.
