### BRIGHT HOPES.

THE PENNSYLVANIA DEMOURACY A New York View of the Situation in this

New York World. The Pennsylvania Democrats have been unusually fortunate this year. Their state convention has been conducted with perfect harmony; the spirit of the party is everywhere enthusiastic, and every independent voter in the Keystone state, even without the help of the outspoken platform, would recognize the ticket yesterday nominated at Harrisburg as the only effectual rallying-point of the opposition to "bosses" in this year of revolts. Not one of all the candidates named at Harris-burg was so much as tainted with a sus-picion of "bossism." Of the nominee for governor, Controller Robert E. Pattison, of Philadelphia, favorable mention has already been made in these columns. He was elected to the important office which he now fills in 1877, running somewhat ahead of his ticket, but as the Republicans were then staggering under the weight of the Hayes fraud of 1876, this fact attracted little attention. Mr. Pattison made so good a controller, he so distinguished himself by his keen attention to tinguished himself by his keen attention to the public interest and his fearless opposi-tion to all sorts of jobbery, that, notwith-standing some unpepularity with one wing of his own party, he was renominated in 1880, and soon developed into such a formidable caudidate that the Ring Republican standard bearer was hastily withdrawn and a safer nominee substituted. Mr. Pattison, however, was re-elected by an overwhelming majority, running 17,000 votes, or about 25 per cent., ahead of the Hancock electors, and carrying the city by 13,000 votes, while the other Democratic nominees were defeated 20,000 votes. This notable circumstance led the World to commend Mr. Pattison last year to the Democrats of Pennsylvania as an eligible nominee for treasurer. He has now been selected as the gubernatorial candidate of the party even in preference to so strong and popular a Democrat as Mr. Eckley Coxe, of Luzerne, and this sclection gives the country the best possible assurance that the Democrats of Pennsylvania have no idea of aiding the Camerous. It will encourage the independents to continue their warfare, since not the most timid of reformers can excuse him-self for failing to support Mr. Pattison by alleging that the interests of the state would be safer in the hands of General Beaver. It will be said of course here

and there that Mr. Pattison's reputation is purely Philadelphian, and that he may suffer as a candidate from the long-standing divorce between the city and the rural districts. But it must be remembered that only through the vote of Philadelphia has the Keystone state been kept in the Republican column, self capable of making a formidable in road upon the Republican majority. From still another point of view Mr. l'attison's nomination is to be commended. The Harrisburg convention is the first great Democratic gathering of the year. It has assembled just at the moment when the country is asking itself where the audacious extravagance of the Republican majority in Congress is to end, and what curb can be put upon the impudent discegard of decency and of efficiency in the civil service displayed by the Republican national committee and the Republican administration. Mr. Pattison's nomination proves that on the great living issue of economical and business like government the Democrats are sound beyond peradventure. Ex-Speaker Randali's de nunciations of Republican recklessness on the floor of Congress are echoed at Harrisburg by the nomination of a public officer of proved capacity and integrity, whose strength with the independent and respectable voters of his state overlaps the lines of his own party. In this sense the nomination is a matter of national interest, and should it ripen into an election, those who remember the political events of 1852 will not be surprised to see it be come a matter of national importance. Democrats all over the country will do well to invite Republicans all over the country to compare the standard bearer of the Demecracy in Pennsylvania with his rival, the agent of a "boss," committed by a machine conviction to the policy of "addition, division and silence," and pledged against reform in all its phases and

The agitation and excitement created by Garibaldi's death is far from being quiet-Foreigners who started to attend last Sunday's celebration are yet arriving share the banquets and the libatious, and they will be able to tell how Rome dines

if they cannot tell how Rome wept over the loss of the great man. It would be a difficult task to report all that was done and said from Susa to Cata nia and from Pola to Nice on this sad occasion. Every city, every village had its own ceremonies. Flags draped in mourning decorated the king's palace as well as the peasant's cottage. Specches were poured on the deceased with such a profusion that, if they had been water, I

think the Alps would have disappeared under the flood. Among the myriads of these rhetorical efforts there was one that especially deserves attention and gives rightly the bature of Garibaldi's historical mission in this century. It was delivered by the prince of Italian parliamentary orators, Mr. Minghetti, the leader of the Right, in Bologna, his own native city.

Italians, said he, will not forget what they owe to Garibaldi so long as the love of their country and the love of virtue remains alive in their hearts. In order to understand Garibaldi's work in the revival of Italy it is necessary to remember the difficulties which stood against Italian unity. It was necessary that at the fit moment all the forces of the nation should at once work together in perfect co-operation. The want of any one of these forces would have retarded the work which thinkers and men of action had for many centuries vainly longed for. It was necessary to have a national dynasty, old and faithful, surrounded by a brave and courageous army; in a word, a prince such as Dante and Machiavelli had forescen and foretold, who would become the leader of the national movement. Such a man was Victor Emanuel. But, on the other hand, the people must help the work and cooperate with the king, and the man
