# Where Men Can go Who do Not Like to Wait for a Bite.

One of the most interesting places in this city to visit is the residence of Geo. Kreiner, No. 26 North Water street. Mr. Kreiner is a dealer in fish of all kinds and makes a specialty of keeping them fresh. He has constructed in his back yard four or five large wooden tanks all of which are connected and in them he keeps his fish alive. He sells more catfish than any other and they are kept alive until they are ordered. These fish are brought from the river in a tank filled with water and are kept fresh. Yesterday Mr. Kreiner received a large supply and the tanks were full. It was a funny sight to see hundreds of catfish averaging nine or ten inches in length swimming around in the big tank. The water is first run into the upper tauk, from which it passes down through the others and then out. One small tauk contains small fish, which are sold to bass fishers for bait, and are kept alive for many days. Yesterday there were a number of visitors to Mr. Kreiner's place, and to persons who have any fondness for fish a visit would be of great mterest.

Mr. Kreiner is the owner of a little dog which takes much interest in the fish. He stands by the tank almost all day, restless ly watching the live catfish. Often when a big one swims close to him he will jump into the tank right among the fish, where he has a jolly good time picking them up and shaking them like rats. He has never been stung or injured by the fish and never tires of the sport.

Mr. Kreiner will shortly bring to this city a live sturgeon, which he will keep alive at his place for some time.

While the autopsy was in progress Warlen Crocker said to a reporter that the manner and place of Guiteau's burial had not yet been determined upon. Mr. Charles H. Reed, Guiteau's counsel, did not witness the execution. He said he could not stand it and intended to leave the city. It is not known whether Mr. Scoville is in town or not. A figure had been made up to look like the neurderer and he was taken to a small scaffold which had been erected. The death warrant was first read and then a black cap was placed over his head after which the rope was adjusted. The strap was sprung and the figure sprung into the air. It was left hanging several hours and then cut down.

The office of the jail has been given completely up to the large corps of newspaper reporters and a squad of them are scribbling away on every table, window sill and every projection that offers a rest for paper. Many newspaper reporters remained all night. The private office of the warden has been transformed temporarily into a telegraph office and before 9 o'clock eight instruments were clicking a merry accompaniment to the gloomy prepara-tions going on inside of the jail. At 9 o'clock there was a constant stream of persons coming to the jail. The scene outside was like that of some great gala occasion. Some enterprising colored men had erected booths from which they dispensed lemonade, cakes and other refreshments to the weary and thirsty people who began before nine o'clock to assemble in the road in front of the jail. Mounted messengers speeding to and from the city and carriages bringing visitors to the jail kept a continual cloud of dust hovering over the road that winds through the wide common that lies between the

It was quite apparent to the guard, who was watching his every movement, that his object in asking for the bath was simply to obtain some employment which might distract his thoughts from the dread contemplation of his appreaching death. He evinced increased nervousness and his uncertain movements, distant manner and a marked tremor in his tones when he attempted to speak, impressed the guard with a belief that he is rapidly weakening. The opinion is expressed by some of the jail officials that he will be unable to control his emotions when the dread moment arrives, and even if he does not completely
