THE PODHALIANS. A Primitive People, Who Keep Suber and Live on Goats' Milk.

There exists high up among the Car-pathian mountains of Galicia, in a district known as Tatras, one of the most primitive and unsophisticated communities in Europe. The population of this remote region numbers several hundred thousand individuals. They neither use strong drink nor eat animal food. Riches have no charm for them. Though poor, they are content, and though their diet is spare and monotonous, they enjoy perfect health and live long lives. The food of these arcadians is principally oats, either simply boiled or ground and converted into cakes. During four or five months of the year those of them who accompany their flocks and herds to the mountain pastures live exclusively on goat whey, of which each man consumes nearly a gallon a day. Practically, therefore, these goatherds live on the sugar and the mineral salts contained in the whey. They do not consider this regimen a privation, and when they return to the valleys at the end of the season they are as strong and vigorous as when they set out. The entire race of Podhalians, as the people of Tatras are called, are remarkable for their vigor and energy, and are incontestably superior, physically and intellectually, to the neighboring populations. Their physique is of a remarkable purity; they are quick of apprehension and frank in manner. Though far from being highly cultured, the Podhalians are poets and artists by nature. They are fond of dancing, and often, when the labors of the day are over, meet to indulge in their favorite diversion. They are born improvisors, too, and many of them can sing their own songs set to music of their own composition.

Eating Python Eggs. Dr. Hermes, the learned director of the Berlin aquarium, did a deed in the inter est of science, only a few days ago, that entitles him to rank among the most in trepid herces of modern times. In the reptile department of the aquarium, fiftysix eggs had been laid by one of the fe male pythons. Dr. Hermes at once resolved to test the availability of serpentine ova for human consumption as an article of food. To this end he invited a select party of local gourmands to lunch, and commenced his experiment by boiling a python's egg for several minutes and offering it-opened in the usual manner-to his guests, who, however, respectfully declued to taste it, upon the ground that cooking had produced no visible alteration in the consistence of its external and internal substances-respectively a greenish leathery skin and an opaque, yolkless, grey Not particularly fancying the look of this egg himself, Dr. Hermes proceeded to open another, and he emptied its contents into a frying pan. Adding butter and salt in due proportions, he soon succeeded, with the aid of a gas stove, in producing a python omelettee, which is reported to have smelt uncommonly appetizing. He valiantly swallowed a mouthful, and pronounced it su-premely toothsome. Fired by his example, all present then partook of the savory mess with apparent relish.
