VERDICT OF ACQUITTAL

BLANCHE AND THE MALLEYS GO PREE The Charge of Judge Granget Criticised as Favoring the Accused-Gossip About

the Defendants. At last the great Malley case is ended. State's Attorney Doolittle did not close his powerful argument for the state until about 3 o'clock Friday afternoon. He charged the accused with murder in the first degree; showed that the motive was sufficient, and that the state had proved

its case beyond a reasonable doubt. Judge Granger, after a short recess, began at 3:05 his charge to the jury. He said the accused were on trial for murder by poison and not for rape nor telling lies. He continued : "You will consider carefully how this girl came to her death. You want to be satisfied, in the first place, as to the cause of death; if you have any doubt about it, the law gives the prisoners the benefit of this doubt. The state claims there is positive evidence to show that death did not result from drowning, while the defense claims there are enough evidences of drowning to at least raise a reasonable doubt. Then you have to consider whether she died of arsenic; whether the quantity taken was suffi cient to cause death. Then you are to consider when, where and by whom the arsenic was administered. All these are vitally important matters. Circumstan tial evidence is to be relied on, but all the circumstances must correspond; all point in one direction. If there is any theory which can reasonably account for death on any other hypothesis than that which the state placed before you it must be accepted. You know, gentlemen, how difficult it is to fix the question of the identity of a person. If the circumstances satis factorily proved constitute, when grouped together, evidence equal to that of two witnesses, it is your duty to find a verdict of conviction; if you are not thus impressed you may find a verdict in the second degree. This is within your power under the law; but it is claimed, and I concur, that this is either a case of murder in the first degree or none at all. With these remarks I leave the case in your hands.'

The charge was twenty-five minutes long. At 3:30 the judge handed the indictment to the foreman of the jury, and sent them to their room. The prisoners grew nervous, and their friends expected a verdict of acquittal immediately. It did not come, but in about five minutes Juror Robert O. Gates created some excitement by appearing at the door and asking for a doctor. It appeared that Juror Hotchkiss. of Bethany, had a fit of vertigo. A constable carried in a pitcher of water, and the juror began to improve. Then the courtroom resumed its customary appearance. Blanche tried to indicate her carelessness by reading a newspaper. The Malleys chatted with their counsel and relatives. At 3:40 Sheriff Tucker took to the juryroom the big map of the West Haven Shore used on the trial. The jurors were evidently fixing the Shore locations. At 4:30, after being just an hour out, the jury returned with a verdict of acquittal in the cases of all three, James, Walter and Blanche.

A murmur of applause swept through the court room, but was promptly checked. The boys were congratulated by friends and relatives; their aunt k'ssed them. Blanche also had her friends, who crowd ed about her. The prisoners at once left the court room. Walter Malley, especially seemed to be in a hurry. The whole family consider this acquittal a vindication of their characters and a condemnation of the accusers. Mrs. Cramer denounces the whole proceeding as unjust, and the West Haven authorities are still confident that their course was the only one they could have consistently pursued. Whether Walter and James will remain

in New Haven is not positively known, but it is supposed they will once more handle their father's and uncle's dry goods. As for Blanche, after being cared for by her counsel and others, she will probably return to New York. The verdiet has not created very great surprise in this city, for under the later developments, or lack of developments, in the case a disagreement was the worst result anticipated. The judge's charge is openly criticised as being unfairly favorable to the accused.
