## SWEPT BY A CYCLONE.

### COALVILLE, BUTLER COUNTY, TORN BY

The Wind Sweeps Through the Coke Country Causing Death and Destruction—The Sad Fate of a Mother and Her Babe.

Coalville, Butler county, a thriving mining town on a branch of the Shenango and Allegheny railroad, forty miles south-east of Greenville, and about fifty miles north of Pittsburgh in an air line, was visited a terrible cyclone Friday evening at 7:10 o'clock. It moved very rapidly, covering an area of about a quarter of a mile wide and about twelve miles long. The first building struck was a grocery store kept by Frank Bard. The building was completed but few days before, and Mr. Bard had just secured his stock and was ready to commence business. The wind struck the building, smashing it into splinters and scattering the contents for several hundred yards in every direction. It was a miracle that all the inmates of the building were not instantly killed. As it was, a sister-in-law of Mr. Bard was severely injured. Connor, the clerk, was severely injured by being thrown under a table though nearly suffocated by the falling debris. The mother and child suffered more from fright than from the slight injury they received. Mr. Bard was not at home when the storm struck his house, and his anxiety on hearing the dreadful news may well be imagined.

About 500 feet from Mr. Bard's house stood a small frame dwelling. The occupants saw the approaching storm and ran out, not a minute too soon, for their home—all they possessed in the world—was torn into kindling wood. From this point the storm swept a clean sweep of about three-quarters of a mile, and nothing but trees, fences, telegraph wires and poles suffered until the town of Coalville was reached. Here the cyclone did its most deadly work. It came without warning, taking the inhabitants completely by surprise and leaving them no chance to escape.

The house first struck belonged to Mr. William Barnes. In less time than it takes to record the fact the building was swept away. There is not a single standard of the whole structure left, and were it not for the stone foundations, which still remain, no one would suppose that a house had ever been there. Mrs. Barnes, with a child in her arms, was carried along by the winds a distance of 500 feet, and into a fence corner, where they were found a few minutes later by the distressed members of the family. The mother and babe were carried into an adjacent house and medical aid summoned, but the physicians came too late, and in about half an hour after she was found Mrs. Barnes died, and not many minutes later her baby also died.

The next house in the pathway of the storm was the residence of William A. Kelley. It was blown to atoms and the nine occupants, Henry Henley, employed as a fireman by the Union coal and coke company, was killed and the rest more or less injured. George Still's house came next. He was more fortunate than some of his neighbors, the building being only slightly moved from its foundation. Still and his family escaped injury. The next place struck was the residence of Wm. Kelly. The Kelly domicile was built on too strong a foundation for the cyclone and stubbornly refused to be blown away. A few yards distant stood the barn, which was blown down and the grain which was contained therein was scattered to the winds. Next on the route was William Clutton's house, which was moved from its foundation, but is still standing. Lewis Owens' store, next to this, was completely demolished and everything lost.

In the barber and shoe shop, adjoining the Owens store, were sitting a crowd of villagers, who were taken completely un-awares. In one second they found themselves piled up in a heap and the shop a total wreck. All were more or less injured, but none fatally. Walker's drug store was also demolished, and the cellar is filled with bits of broken glass. All that can be seen of what was once a drug store is the mortar and pestle. Dr. De Wolf's house and barn, the Mill's house and the residence of the Kelso family were badly wrecked. The occupants escaped with slight injuries. Riester's hall and McQueen's house, adjoining, were completely destroyed. Mr. and Mrs. McQueen being badly injured. The physician says they may possibly recover. Next stood a butcher shop which was partially destroyed. Here the storm skipped over the grocery and a new dwelling adjoining, and struck a small house, the wind blowing a mile or more on its course through the woods, which bears evidence of its terrible power. Staunch old trees, some of them no doubt half a century old, were uprooted and hoisted up half way out of the ground.

A water spout at Manitow, Colorado, on Saturday night, washed a mile of railroad track, and drowned a boy. Henry Foster, a tight-rope performer, was killed by falling from a rope stretched across a street, in Omaha, on Saturday evening. He was 25 years of age.

Mrs. Deacon, wife of a farmer, was struck by a train while driving a milk wagon across the railroad track in Burlington, New Jersey, yesterday morning, and so badly injured that she died in a few hours. A dispatch has been received in San Francisco reporting the destruction of an Indian settlement in Tejon Donjon by a cloud-burst. Several persons were drowned, and many injured by drifting timber. During a light between whites and negroes at Brooksville, Florida, a few days ago, three colored men, named Turner, were killed and several others were wounded. Several white men were wounded, none mortally. William Bean was stabbed to death by Coleman, in a family quarrel at Council Grove, Kansas, on Saturday. Coleman fled to a piece of woodland, where he was shot dead by the sheriff who tried to capture him. Thomas Phillips, a miner in the Butler

colliery at Carbondale, Pa., was removing some blasting powder last Friday, when it was exploded by the mine lamp on his hat, and he was so badly injured that he died soon after.

The body of the assassin Guitreau was buried on Saturday afternoon in the northeast corridor of the District of Columbia jail. John W. Guitreau and Rev. Dr. Hicks were present at the interment. There was no religious service at the grave.

In Brooksville, Florida, three colored men named Turner, had been for several days visiting the village armed, and indulged in threats against some of the citizens, making much bad feeling. This culminated a few days since in a row in the court house, started by one of the Turners entering the building just as the afternoon session of the court was being called, with an open knife in hand. In the row that followed the three Turners were killed and several other negroes participating wounded. Several whites were wounded, but not mortally.

Late Losses by Fire. The Texas Pacific freight depot at Fort Worth, Texas, was burned on Friday evening with a large quantity of goods. The loss is estimated at \$150,000. The Plankinton building, in Milwaukee, was burned on Saturday morning, and an adjoining building was greatly damaged by the falling walls. Several firms were burned out, and the loss is estimated at \$95,000.

M. Thomas & Sons' auction house, Nos. 139 and 141 South Fourth street Philadelphia, was totally destroyed by fire on Saturday night. The building was of brick and stone, five stories high, and had a depth of 200 feet. Several adjoining buildings were damaged by water and falling walls. The building and lot are valued at \$200,000. There is an insurance of \$40,000 on the structure, and \$10,000 on the contents. The origin of the fire is as yet undetermined. The firm will resume business at once, and an auction sale being held in the Philadelphia exchange.

### A MISSING PRINCE.

#### Why a Fashionable Wedding Was Postponed.

Philadelphia Record. Quite a flutter has been caused in the circles of high society by the postponement of the wedding of Miss Allie Bouvier with the Prince Valerie. The lady is well known and comes from an old Philadelphia family. Her sister is the wife of Lieutenant Frank Drexel. As the story goes, while Miss Bouvier was traveling abroad a short time since she met the prince, who was engaging in his manners, and who is said to be of the Italian branch of the Legationists, his mother being a Bourbon. The prince and Miss Bouvier met each other frequently, and finally it was decided they should get married. Then the trouble began. The prince did not desire to get married in France, because of the troubles with the law, but was willing to come to America for the wedding, so it was decided that some money should take place in this city. The fact that the wedding was to occur in this city caused considerable talk in society circles, and the young lady was congratulated upon all hands for her good fortune in having captured the prince. The most elaborate preparations were made for the event and the invitations were prepared.

The prince promised when he left his inn at Paris to follow her to the United States as soon as he settled some small business matters. As the day for his arrival approached there was considerable anxiety of the young ladies to catch a glimpse of the prince. A relative went to New York, but the prince failed to arrive on the steamer. Letters and telegrams failed to reach him, and nothing has been learned of the whereabouts of the Bourbon since. The wedding has been consequently postponed until the prince is found, and H. Deacon, a relative of the young lady, has been dispatched to Paris to clear up the mystery, and, if possible, find the prince. The family and friends of the lady believe that some accident has happened to the prince, and until apprised otherwise they will be loth to believe anything else.
