AGRICULTURAL.

GOOD CONDITION OF THE CROPS.

Sorts of Staples Plentiful-Tob Troubled with the Cut Worm. A stated meeting of the Lancaster county agricultural and horticultural society was held in their room in City hall on Monday. The meeting was unusually small, only the following named officers

and members being present :
Joseph F. Witmer, president, Paradise M. D. Kendig, secretary pro tem., Cresswell; John H. Landis, Manor; Henry Kurtz, Mount Joy; Levi S. Reist, Oregon; C. L. Hunsecker, Manheim township; Israel L. Landis, Manheim township; Peter S. Reist, Lititz; F. R. Diffenderffer, city; J. M. Johnston, city; W. W. Griest, city; W. B. Paxson, Colerain.

Crop Reports. Reports on the condition of crops being called for, Henry Kurtz, of Mount Joy, reported the wheat crop as being unusually good. He presented to the society a bunch of Fultz wheat, the stalks of which measuned five feet and eight inches in length, and were very finely headed; he expects the wheat to yield about forty bushels to the acre. The grass crop is pretty good, and a good deal of it has already been cut. Hay is selling at \$18(a)21 per ton. Some of the tobacco fields look pretty well and some of them very unpromising a good deal of prepared ground is not yet plauted; never knew the crop to be so backward as it is this year; in some sections the cut-worms are very troublesome and in some others they are not. Oats looks well, and so does the corn.

Levi S. Reist, of Oregon, reported the wheat in his neighborhood as looking better than it had looked for years, and the grass much better than was expected a month ago. Apples are dropping off, and the prospect of a good crop is not promis-ing; the York Imperial, the Baldwin and one or two other varieties are well set with fruit. Pears will be scarce. It is a curious fact that in some places there are plenty of cherries and in others, not a half a mile away, the trees are empty. Oats looks well. Tobacco is very irregular, some of the plants being well grown and others very small. On the whole, the condition of farm crops is encouraging.

C. L. Hunsecker, of Manheim township, said the wheat never looked better. The hay crop is a very good one and the oats excellent. The corn is backward, but healthy looking, and there is promise of an immense crop. From appearance the tobacco crop will not exceed that of last year. Potatoes are very promising. Of apples and peaches there are some and of

pears and cherrics plenty.

John H. Landis, of Manor, said the straw of the wheat was heavy and the grain as fine as any ever grown here or elsewhere. Most of the grass has been cut and there is a full crop of hay. There was not much oats planted in his neighborhood. The peculiarity about the to bacco crop is that the cut-worm appears to have attacked it in spots; three or four or half a dozen adjoining farms will be found to be greatly troubled with the a dozen farms are almost free from the pest. Apples are falling off and the crop will not be plentiful. The peach crop will be tolerably good-the trees are not very full of fruit, but the fruit will be all better. There are no cherries in his neighborhood. W. B. Paxson, of Colerain, reported

wheat very promising in the lower townships. Where the grass was well set and not frozen out there is an abundance of hay. Corn is small but looks healthy. Oats is not promising, there being a great deal of smut in it. There are very few peaches; farmers in Colerain find it very difficult to get peach trees to grow; don't think there will be five bushels of peaches in the township Apples will be abund ant; cherries are scarce. The early planted tobacco looks well and is growing finely, but there was great trouble in securing early plants. The later planted fields are ravaged by worms.

President Witmer, of Paradise, said the

reports from other township fairly stated the condition of crops in his own. As to tobacco great trouble has been experienced in getting it set; in the first place the season was late and unfavorable, the plants small, weather much of the time unfit for planting; then the cut worm was very bad, compelling many of the farmers to replant their fields several times. One of his neighbors who had set out 12,000 plants had 9,000 destroyed by the cut worm. He had noticed a peculiarity in a number of cherry trees that were in full bloom when a northeast rain storm set in and lasted for a week; on the northeast side of the trees there is no fruit at all, while on the opposite side the trees are well filled. Shall We Have a Fair?

Henry Kurtz wanted to know whether it was the intention of the society to hold a county fair next fall. Many of his neighbors had been asking him about it and seemed to be desirous of entering their stock in competition for premiums. He suggested Mount · Joy as a good place for such an exhibition and effered fifteen acres of the land on his farm as a proper place for holding it.

Mr. Kurtz's suggestion met with no encouragement; the president stating that the number present at the meeting was too small to take action on so important a

Owing to the absence of the secretary and the essayists appointed at the last meeting the society found itself without the usual topics for discussion; and on motion, the matters intended to be acted upon at this meeting were postponed to next meeting. Immigration.

"Should immigration be encouraged?"

was a question proposed for discussion by C. L. Hunsecker, who after stating the population of the principal countries, of the world, and showing the almost boundless extent of our own, made a sensible argument in tavor of encouraging the immigration of industrious artizans and laborers. Nobody else appeared to tackle the problem; Henry Kurtz merely saying that he had not intended to say anything on the subject; "but an idea had just struck him; this question of immigration reminded him of that passage in the Bible where we read that we are ordered to go out into the highways and hedges and bring in the lame and the halt and the blind and present them as an offering to the Lord!" This luminous and convinc ing argument raised a laugh, during which Mr. Kurtz sat down, and the society sat down on the further discussiom of the

subject. Strawberries and Cherries. J. H. Landis and C. L. Hunsecker were appointed to report upon three or four varieties of cherries and one variety of strawberries laid before the society by Levi S. Roist, all of which were commended by the committee.

Adjourned.
