THE DEMOCRATIC CAMPAIGN. Resolutions Passed by the State Cor The Purchasable Vote.

Harrisburg Dispatch to the Times. The meeting of the Democratic state committee in this city to-day was apparently highly satisfactory to those who par-ticipated in its deliberations. All except members of the committee were excluded. The members of the committee are said to have generally given a good account of the situation in their respective districts, but a few gave notes of warning that if the Democrats expected to win a victory over the regular Republicans, supported by the national administration, they would be required to make one of the most determined and systematic fights in the history of the party. The committee was admonished that no effort would be spared by the Stalwart leaders to buy the purchasable com-modity in the Democratic ranks, and hints were thrown out that negotiations were already pending for the capture of thousands of voters. One or two members talked as if the Greenback-Labor candidate for governor, although a Re-publican, was expected by the Beaver men to draw more votes from the Democrats than the Republicaus. The old game, they said, would be repeated, if possible, of having Democratic Greenbackers vote

Chairman Hensel was sustained in all his plans for the prosecution of the cam-paign with great unanimity, the members of the committee generally placing great confidence in his capacity to conduct a successful contest against the Republicans. Toward the close of the proceedings of the committee Black, Elliott and Africa were conducted to the meeting place of the committee and made brief speeches, in which they stated that they would do all in their power to achieve success. The candidates, so far as their canvass has thus far extended, reported the outlook for Democratic success exceedingly favor-

In the contested election case of Doyle and Matthews, of Philadelphia, the committee decided to admit both persons, giving each a half vote. Dr. Burchfield, of Clearfield, offered a resolution, which was adopted unanimously, "That the sec-retaries this day chosen shall be the officers of this committee when in session, and the chairman of the state committee shall have power to appoint such secretaries, stenographers and agents as he may deem proper to aid him in his personal work in charge of the campaign." Mr. Blackford, of York, offered a resolution, which passed unanimously, "That the chairman of the state committee shall have exclusive charge of the financial af fairs of the campaign. He may appoint such finance and executive committees as his judgment approve, and he may em-ploy and pay special agents to aid in state organization in any section or county in the state.

Appreciates Its Work. Times, Ed.

The Democratic state committee, at its meeting in Harrisburg yesterday, appeared to understand the desperation of the fight which has been undertaken. If the committee does not at any point un derestimate the resources and the charac ter of the Stalwart campaign it will have done a great deal toward winning the fight. It evidently starts with a knowledge of the situation, and Chairman Hensel can be safely trusted to take care of the rest.

Workingmen, Don't You Forget It. Lycoming Chronicle.

"If Hancock is elected, this establishment will close," "If you want your iron mills closed, and all industries dependent upon them brought to a stand still, vote for Hancock."

The above expressions were common in Republican papers in 1880, and many workingmen 'were frightened and deceived into voting the Republican ticket at that time. Hancock was not elected, but Garfield was, and what has been the result? Have "better wages" followed his election? No; the miners of this country are getting only 90 cents per day now. Has "steady work" been "assured" to the men in the iron mills and elsewhere? No; there are now one hundred and fifty thousand men in "ganeral idleners" and who did not reach 'general idleness," and who did not reach this pitiable condition by the election of General Hancock. The rosente times promised to follow the election of General Garfield have not come, but instead, strikes for higher wages and "general idleness" have. The Republicans can not get rid of the logical effect of their own proposition. Two years have passed since the last presidential election, and, although Hancock was not elected the iron mills, as said, are closed, and over one hundred thousand workingmen are out of work. Had that of 1880 been the first attempt made by re-publicans to deceive the laboring men, there might be some excuse, but it was not. Time and again has this same old story been rehashed and the workingmen bitten by the lying bait every time. It is about time they are getting their eyes open to their own interests.

Organize at Ouce. Lebanon Advertiser.

Let organization be commenced at once in every school district. Let the first work be the preparation of lists of Democratic voters, so that the assessments may be properly and completely made. Let the aim now be to register every voter. There is nothing more annoying than to find, when it is too late, that this one and that one is not assessed and that his vote is lost thereby. Prepare your lists now, and have them constantly at hand and in mind, for additions and corrections, so that by the time the registers close, the work may have been done perfectly. The labor re-quired will not be nearly as great as most persons imagine,—it only requires a little intelligent attention. Do not wait to be appointed for the work, but let one or more in each school district do it voluntarily, and when completed hand the same over to the township committee for final examination and assessment.
