A DAUGHTER'S THREAT TO KILL. Opposed in Love, a Young Girl Attempts ther Father's Life.

Joseph Foreman, a wealthy farmer and politician, living at the southern extremity of the Eighth ward, Camden, yesterday morning appeared before Justice Smith and caused a warrant to be issued for the arrest of his daughter Ida, upon the charge of having attempted to take his life. The family has been regarded as highly respectable and Ida, the daughter, more than ordinarily accomplished and beautiful. For some time she had been receiving the attentions of a young man, contrary to her father's wishes, and in this fact and its complications is found the secret of the family trouble. During the past few months two brothers named Gardiner, both farmers, residing on the Blackwoodtown pike, have been payin: marked attentions to the two daughters of Mr. Foreman, Ida and Mary. The old gentleman is familiar with the Gardiner family and for some reason only known to himself forbid the visits of the young men The opposition of the father, however, was not heeded.

Mr. Foreman, becoming exasperated at the persistency of the Gardiners and the disobedience of his children, and particu larly that of Ida caused her to be confined to her room for several days. She escaped from her place of continement, however, and when next seen by her father was in the company of her forbidden suitor, Charles Gardiner. Mr. Foreman became furious and threatened his daughter with great vehemence. This meeting took place a few days ago, on the Foreman farm. When the father returned to his home that night he found in the refrigerator two small packages of white powder close by the milk can from which he generally sipped at night before retiring. His suspicious being aroused, he refrained from drinking any milk that night. In the morning he asked his daughter for an explanation of the presence of the suspicious packages. He was horrified when the girl boldly as serted that it was arsenic she had pur chased to destroy his life, and further, threated to use it if he did not cease interfering in her affairs. Yesterday morning Mr. Foreman informed his daughter that she would be shortly confined in the insane asylum, as he did not think she was possessed of her proper sense. The daugh ter became very angry, and, after hesitating for a few minutes, ran into the kitchen and, seizing a large carving kuife, rushed upon her father, making an effort to stab him. Her arm was caught by her mother just in time to save the father from receiving the blow from the murderous blade, and after some difficulty the ugly weapon was wrested from her grasp. She left the house shortly after this scene, and up to a

Mr. Foreman immediately repaired to the office of Justice Smith and detailed the facts as stated, upon which a warrant was issued for the girl's arrest. A search of her room disclosed a new revolver, carefully hidden in her trunk, and near by it a new box of cartridges. A search of the surrounding country failed to discover the whereabouts of the young woman. She is eighteen years of age, light complexioned and medium heighth, neatly attired in a dark cashmere dress.
