For the Husbandman and Householder.

Germantown Telegraph. The United States produces, according to the reports of the census, 44,113,365 bushels of barley, 11,817,327 of buckwheat, 1,754,861,532 of Indian corn, 406,859,999 of oats, 29,831,595 of rye, and 459,479,505 of wheat. Of the several states, Califor nia produces the most barley, 12,589,561 bushels; New York the most buckwheat,

4,461,200 bushels; Illinois the most corn 325,792,481 bushels, oats 63,189,200 bushels; and Pennsylvania the most rye, 3,683,621 bushels. Recently we called attention to the turnip as being in season to sow. It is worth remembering in addition to what we said then, that if the ground be rich it may be sown in many parts of the Middle States as late as the first of September, with every prospect of a fair crop. The turnip grows very rapidly when the soil is rich, and indeed for garden use the plant should be grown in no other than the richest soil

A late sown turnip in rich soil is always a distinct vegetable from the turnip sown early in poor ground and lett to struggle with fate as bost it may. The one is almost as good as an apple to eat rawbetter indeed than some apples of considerable popularity; while the slow grown turnip is not, and is wiry even when

What a Bushel Weighs in Pounds. A correspondent in Ohio asks us to give him the weight of farm products in pounds in that state, for the reason that while there, he was told that a law existed in that state providing for the sale of grain, sceds and vegetables by the pound; or in other words, that a bushel must weigh sc many pounds; it is not a rule observed, and that an effort was about to be made in his section to enforce the law.

The following will be found to be to legal weight in pounds for a bushel i Ohio of the annexed farm products Wheat 60, rye 56, oats 33, corn, shelled 56, corn, in the ear, 70, corn meal 60, barley 45, buckwheat 59, millet 50, timothy 45, flaxseed 56, Irish potatocs 60, sweet potatoes 50, white beans 60, parsnips 60. In Pennsylvania the following are the legal weights: Wheat 60 pounds, rye 56 corn 56, cornmeal 55, cloverseed 60, tim-othy seed 44, clover 62, blue grass seed 45, flax seed 56, white beans 60, trish po tatoes 56, onions 57, turnips 55, cornmea 48, bran 20, barley 47, buckwheat 48.

### TILDEN'S INCOME TAX.

The Government Counsel Understood to be in Favor of Dismissing the Suit. The income tax case of the United States against Samuel J. Tilden has been for some time under consideration by the secretary of the treasury and the attorney general. It is understood that some of the counsel engaged in it are desirous of having it dismissed, for the reason that they would be pecuniarily benefited by such a disposition of it. On the 23d of May, Secretary Folger addressed a letter to Green B. Raum, in which he said that if the facts in the possession of the government council did not warrant them in going on with the case, it should be discontinued, but it was a matter to be left entirely in their hands. Attorney General Brewster also concurred in this view. Judge Pierrepont and the other counse have been notified of the position of the government.

The Work of an Earthquake. On the 11th and 12th of last month Siena, Italy, was visited by a series of alarming earthquake shocks. The soldiers were all turned out of the barracks, and the people rushed out of their houses on to the Lizza for safety. The houses rocked; the plaster came tumbling down the chimucys. The shocks were repeated, some strong, some weak, throughout the day at intervals of a quarter to half an nour. The bells were rung; the thrice holy Madonna del Vuote was uncovered. Some of the nobility, afraid of their own houses, had their carriages dragged to the Lizza and slept there in the open air. At 2 in the morning there came a shock as strong and terrifying as if a mine had been sprung under the city. After that the force of the concussion decreased. As to the causes of the phenomenon, there can be no doubt, a correspondent asserts, that it was owing to the municipality having just put up two tablets to Garibaldi.

PLEASURE SEEKERS WAYLAID. A Party Robbed While Riding Down Green

As Messrs. John and Isaac W. Howe, o Boston, were coming down Green Mountain, near Bar Harbor, Me., about one o'clock Wednesday afternoon on a buckboard with a party of ladies, the team was stopped by an armed highwayman and the Howes were forced to give up their gold watches and money, the total value being \$1,300 or \$1,400. The robber was armed with a brace of large pistols. A large party has started in pursuit of the miscreaut, and a reward of \$1,000 is offered for his capture, dead or alive.

GENERAL BAILY'S STATEMENT. The State Fully Secured Against Loss—Go Sail and Sufficient Receipts.

State Treasurer Baily states that the state treasury had on deposit in the Ex-change bank, at Franklin, \$85,000, and holds Cashier Craft's receipts for that amount. Besides these, he also has the sworn statement of the bank, made at the end of each month, which is required from all banks in which state funds are deposit ed. As an additional security the state has a bond of \$100,000 from the bank, the sureties on which are men amply able to pay the amount of the state's deposits. Re-garding the statement that the state treasury was only credited with \$22,000 on Craft's books, and that the bank does not consider itself liable for any larger amount. General Baily says that his receipts are sufficient, and he is not supposed to keep books at both ends of the line. He is not in the least alarmed, and says the state will get every cent deposited with the Ex-change bank. Craft's defalcation, it is believed, will entail a loss of \$200,000 on the bank

A Cable Connection for Two Continents. The Central & South American cable ompany, with wires touching at points on the Mexican & Central American coasts, crossing the Isthmus of Panama and extending along the western coast of South America to Calloa, announce that its lines will be completed and thrown open to the public use by the close of the present month. Connection will be made at Galveston with the Western Union telegraph company, and at Callao with the Trans Continental & Eastern telegraph system of South America, so that the two continents of the Western Hemisphere will be n communication.
